Representative Brandon Reed of Hodgenville has been named chairman of the Subcommittee on Equine Issues within the Kentucky General Assembly.

As co-chair of the committee alongside Senator Steve West, Reed will be tasked with highlighting issues in the equine industry that could require legislation in the coming session. The committee will meet in November to hear testimony on challenges facing the industry.

Reed serves on both the House Agriculture Committee and Tobacco Settlement Oversight Committee, and formerly served as Kentucky's State FFA President.

"As someone who

comes from a farming family, I know just how significant agriculture is to our way of life in rural Kentucky," said Reed. "The horse industry is a significant part of the Commonwealth's heritage, and I pledge to work for the good of all involved to continue growing its influence." As of the most re-

cent Kentucky Equine Survey, the 24th House District, which includes Green, Larue and Marion counties, has a total of 3,800 horses at an estimated value of \$11,489,000. In the past, the

committee has heard testimony from industry experts on a variety of topics, ranging from penalties for animal cruelty involving horses to drug testing within the horse industry.


