New Coach to Lead Clearwater This Season

Clearwater will be a team that area basketball fans will want to watch this season. The Tigers' team is loaded with talent. Clearwater also has a new coaching team.

Zac Moore is the new head coach. He is joined on the bench by assistant coaches Assistant Coaches: Richie Ayers and Garrett Alexander .

Coach Moore has been a coach since 2003. He was assistant coach for Poplar Bluff High School 2003-2005 when the Mules were back-to-back state champs. Since 2005, he has coached at the Oak Hill Academy Summer basketball camp coach. He coached at the University of North Carolina Summer basketball camp in 2006 and 2007 and at the Southeast Missouri State Summer basketball camp coach from 2007 to 2010. He was Jackson Girls Assistant Coach

2010-2011, Jackson Boys Freshman Coach 2011-2012, Cape Central Girls Freshman Coach 2012-2013, Doniphan Girls Head Coach 2013-2015, and Dexter Boys Head JV and Freshman Coach 2015-2017.

Coach Moore said that the Tigers' starting five will be Karson Fay, Nathan Maughn, Gage Keller, Taylor Hicks, and Heath Ayers. Last season, Ayers was all-conference in both the OFC and BRL and received all-district honors.

"We will be pressing as compared to sitting back in a 2-3 zone and looking to push the ball on offense," Moore stated. "We will be speeding the game up and pressing. We have a good core of players coming back that saw lots of time at the varsity level and will be quick on defense. Our weaknesses are lack of height and lack of depth.

The Black River League and Ozark Foothills Conference are going to be very competitive. "We are looking to go out and play on the right side of the bracket and compete for championships," Moore said.

The JV team will be small in size, but can really shoot the ball, according to Coach Moore.

Clearwater's team philosophy this season is, "Being a hard working team, working on the fundamentals daily. We are developing a new culture with new standards. Holding each other responsible, and ones self-accountability. We are also working on getting comfortable being uncomfortable and by that pushing each other to be their absolute best. We want to play at a fast past and play tenacious defense. We all also want to development young men who can be

great leaders later on in life and applying the life skills they learn through the sport of basketball."

The Tigers have set high goals for the season. They want to play on the right side of tournaments, and compete for championships

Heath Ayers is the tallest player on the team at 6'3". The shortest players on the team are Daylan Conner and Richy McKinney at 5'5".

Gage Keller will be looked on to fill many roles on the team. He is expected to impact the team for scoring and will also ge guarding the other team's best player

Five players on the team have varsity experience—Heath Ayers, Taylor Hicks, Gage Keller, Karson Fay, Nick Middleton, Trent Miller, and Nathan Maughn.

Coach Moore foresees his

team as having a balanced scoring attack. "I can see the team having a different leading scorer each night," Moore said.

When asked if he foresees any playing having a breakout season, Coach Moore responded, "Taylor Hicks is a player I

see ready for big year." Gage Keller and Nick Middleton are two players to watch; both have over 30-inch verticals.

"I can see Karson Fay stepping up and being a floor general this year and running point for us," Moore said."

Will Copeland is a 6'1" senior guard/forward. He averaged 10 points per game, 5 rebounds per game, and three assists per game. He has the ability to fill many roles on the team. "Offensively and defensively, Will can play anyone on the floor," said Coach Peterson. "He is one of two leaders on the team."

Senior Rylee Hunter is a 6'0" guard/gord. He averaged 7 ppg and 4 rpg last season. "We will rely on Rylee to guard and rebound consistently and get us 8-10 points per game," said Coach Peterson.

Austin Grimes is a 6'1" junior forward. He averaged 2 ppg and 3 rpg last season. "Austin will get the task of guarding the opponents best player; he has improved his overall game in the last couple of years," Peterson said.

Sophomore Brycen King is a 6'0" guard. He was the leading scorer a year ago. "He can flatout shoot it; he needs to get more rebounds for us this year and more defensive consistency," Peterson said. King averaged 14 ppg and 2 assists per game. He hit 76 of 186 three-points (41 percent).

Kyle Conkright is a 5'10" sophomore point guard. Last season, he averaged 10

ppg, 4 apg, and 2 steals per game. "He along with Will Copeland are our two leaders," Peterson said. "He's a true point guard that can also score."

"At some point in the season, hopefully earlier than later, we need Caleb Whitehead (who is returning to us after sitting out his sophomore season) to fill that huge sixth man role," Peterson said. "We're also going to have to have some other sophomores such as Trevor Copeland, Carson Anderson, and Carson McNail to come up from the JV and give us some valuable varsity minutes.
