And, again this time, some even younger folks will have to step up.


"We have a new JV team and it's the first time we've had a JV team in about 10 years," said Strang. "So we'll be bringing some of the younger ones up to the varsity."

Those youngsters will have to learn quickly, though, what with Satsuma, who Strang says is "always good," moving into the Saints' area this season.

St. Paul's also has some 6A and 7A teams on its schedule this season.

"It's exciting because of the younger players maturing a lot quicker than I thought. We've got 400 kids in the high school and we'll be competing against

For Strang, who has been either a coach or administrator at St. Paul's for the past 43 years, the plan for 2019 is simple.
