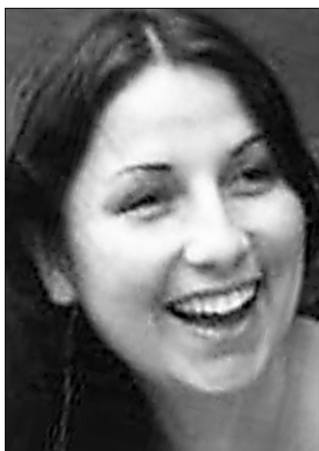
He was a self-employed ceramic tile layer.

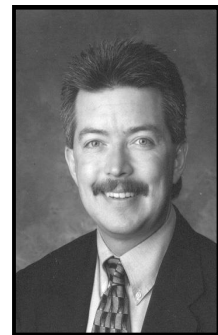
