#### CONSU BERGH REPORTS.

Tells Manufacturers What to Send to Sweden.

Robert S. S. Bergh, United States consul at Gothenburg, Sweden, has issued a hint to Americans in a report on his latest trip to Sweden.

"Many business men here think that the import of motor carriages into Sweden, if once properly started, would be considerable, provided they can be made durable, neat in appearance, safe and easy to handle, and not too expensive.

"The chief objection to motor cars, with accumulators or storage batteries, was that they could not make sharp enough turns. The cars were built with the batteries placed close to the back wheels.

"At present there is only a petroleum motor carriage and a light motor-cycle in Gothenburg, both of French manufacture. I believe there is an American motor carriage in Stockholm; but American manufacturers ought to pay attention, also, to the markets in the other cities of this kingdom, especially Gothenburg and Malmo.

"Electric motor carriages are preferred for city traffic. Those with benzine motors are said to be noisy and to emit offensive gases."

# IRON FOR THE WORLD.

### Extensive Operations Projected in Sweden and Norway.

The Scandinavians are about to construct a thoroughly up-to-date harbor at the terminus of Ofoten fjord, Norway, of the railroad from the Gellivara iron mines in Sweden, says the New York Sun.

This is one of the greatest interests to British iron manufacturers, because Sweden is likely to be their main source of iron ore for many years to come.

The mines of Bilbao, Spain, have long fed the blast furnaces of England with much of the iron ore that country has turned into pig iron.

The Swedish mines are now almost exhausted, and Sweden is coming to the front as the source of British supply. The Swedes have no coal with which to smelt their ore, and they are, therefore, willing to sell their product abroad.

The most famous center of their iron mining is Gellivara, not far from the Baltic, and considerably north of the arctic circle. It has an apparently inexhaustible supply of ore, and for years a railroad has brought it down to the Baltic for shipment.

#### MARSHALL COMMITS SUICIDE.

Contracted Malarial Fever While in Cuba and Worried Over Business Affairs.

Iowa City, Iowa, Jan. 4.—Capt. W. W. Marshall of Des Moines, who was for four years deputy postmaster of Des Moines and had previously been connected with the passenger department of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad, committed suicide by shooting.

Hill City, S. D., Jan. 4.—Fire started in the McClure hotel and the building and contents were destroyed, together with the adjoining building. The fire jumped across the street and consumed six store buildings, stopping with the office of the Hill City News.

#### Supreme Justices Sworn In.

St. Paul, Jan. 4.—Justices Lewis and Lovely took their places on the supreme bench yesterday. Attorney General Douglas presented to the court the two judges-elect, they were sworn in by Chief Justice Start to observe the laws and the constitution and to perform their duties "faithfully and impartially according to my best learning, judgment and discretion," and they took their seats without further ritual.

#### Supreme Court Organized.

Pierre, S. D., Jan. 4.—The newly-elected members of the supreme court were sworn in and Justice Fuller was selected as presiding judge for the first two years of the term, to be followed by Justice Haney for the second period of two years and Justice Carson for the last two years.

#### Cross-Bill Filed.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 4.—The Montana Ore Purchasing company has filed its cross-bill in the Johnson case, recently decided in its favor and against the Boston & Montana. The bill amounts to \$324,134, of which \$258,373 was for development work and \$21,891 for exports.

#### DEWEY WILL NOT COME.

He Declines the Invitation to the St. Paul Carnival.

Washington, Jan. 5.—The formal invitation of Gov. Lind, Mayor Kiefer, the Commercial club and the Carnival association to Admiral Dewey to visit St. Paul on the occasion of the carnival festivities was presented to the admiral last evening by Senator Davis.

#### WANT INDIAN'S LAND.

#### ON TRIAL FOR MURDER.

Eugene Buell is Accused of Killing P. J. Nelson.

Ashland, Wis., Jan. 5.—The murder case of the state vs. Eugene Buell has begun here. Buell is accused of murdering Peter J. Nelson of Hayward two years ago.

#### To Test Baking Powder Law.

St. Paul, Jan. 5.—Steps have been taken for a test case of the new baking powder law, and the state dairy department has put into the hands of Assistant County Attorney Zollman the material for two prosecutions.

#### Doctors Favor Vivisection.

Winona, Minn., Jan. 5.—At a meeting of the Winona County Medical society held here a resolution was unanimously adopted protesting against the passage by congress of the bill now before it providing for the prohibition of vivisection.

#### Cattle Were Killed.

St. Paul, Jan. 5.—An east-bound Northern Pacific stock train and the Chicago, Great Western passenger train No. 2, east-bound, collided at the junction of the Northern Pacific and Wisconsin Central tracks.

#### Large Land Sales.

Crookston, Minn., Jan. 5.—The Great Northern land office has just completed a report of the december business. Almost 5,000 acres of land have been sold, mostly situated in Polk county.

#### Tired of Life.

St. Paul, Jan. 5.—Daniel Molinen died yesterday morning while the patrol wagon was taking him to the city hospital from his room at 456 East Seventh street.

#### Improvements at Spearfish.

Spearfish, S. D., Jan. 5.—The improvements in this city for the past year amount to considerably over \$100,000, including the new dormitory at the Spearfish normal.

#### Brewers Incorporate.

New Ulm, Minn., Jan. 3.—The John Hauenstein Brewing company has been incorporated, with a capital stock of \$100,000.

# BUSHNELL'S LAST.

### The Ohio Governor Sends a Message to His Lawmakers.

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 5.—Gov. Bushnell's last message to the legislature was submitted to that body yesterday. Among other things he said the state had suffered from the loss of capital through inducements offered by other states; that further taxation of corporations would not benefit the state; that though the prosperity of the past year had been unparalleled, there was still room for benefitting the laboring classes by additional safeguards for their rights, and especially in providing better sanitary conditions in places of labor.

#### LOSS TO THE NAVY.

Death of Commander Carlin and Capt. Ingate Announced.

Washington, Jan. 5.—The navy department has been advised by a cable message from Admiral Watson of the death of Commander James W. Carlin on board the Culgoza, from an attack of peritonitis.

#### MUD VOLCANOES BUSY.

Gas Wells Also at Work—The Result of the Earthquake.

Sandiego, Cal., Jan. 5.—Reports received from the back country show that the recent earthquake was the cause of a number of strange happenings. The mud volcanoes on the desert near the Colorado river have become active after a long rest, and are now spouting mud again.

#### ROYAL YACHT CAPSIZED.

Disaster Attends the Queen's New Boat When Being Unlocked.

London, Jan. 5.—An attempt made to unlock the royal yacht Victoria and Albert at Pembroke proved disastrous. Immediately after she floated the yacht listed 30 degrees to port and her starboard bilge keel became jammed.

#### DAVIS TO RETIRE.

#### Forger Pleads Guilty.

Jameson, N. Y., Jan. 5.—Alba M. Kent, Jr., of this city, who was recently arrested in Japan and extradited, charged with forging notes and obtaining \$10,000 thereby, yesterday pleaded guilty to two indictments for forgery and was sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor for three years and two months.

#### Sailing of Canadian Troops.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 5.—It is stated by the militia department that the transports Laurentia and Moltuzema, carrying the second Canadian contingent to South Africa will sail from Halifax on the 18th inst and the Pomeranian on the 20th. The Western squadrons will go by the last steamer.

#### Sunk in Collision.

Boston, Jan. 5.—The United States tug Resolute, which runs between this city and Fort Wadsworth, was sunk in a collision with the Reading Coal Company's tug Swatrl in the harbor last night. It is believed all the men on the Resolute were saved except the engineer, who is missing.
