Their Oldest Church in America.

The oldest Norwegian Lutheran church at Muskego, Wis., the first church of the kind erected in America, is to be moved to Minneapolis and is even now taken apart and ready for removal as soon as it is finally determined where the theological seminary of the United Norwegian Lutheran church is to be built for the old church will be the pride of the seminary campus.

The main part of the church is 24x34 feet and the choir is 17x24. Primitive as was the architectural knowledge of its builders, and rude their tools, they realized that they were building a church, and hence they tried to copy the old Norse style of a main building and a sort of an addition for the altar and sacristy.

It will be restored to its original appearance as far as possible and one of the objects of the Rev. Gerhard Rasmussen's coming trip to Muskego is to secure from some of the old pioneers information as to what the interior arrangements were like. He also hopes to secure the original baptismal font. This was hewn out of a solid oak tree and is a very rare sort of a front at the best, but highly interesting nevertheless. The font was in existence a few years ago and Mr. Rasmussen hopes to find it. He and President Hoyne of the United Church have advanced all the expense up to date and are very enthusiastic about the venerable building.

Halvor N. Larson knew more about building than any of the Muskego pioneers and he became the architect, builder and superintendent of construction. He was ably assisted by Even Heg, Johannes Skovstad, Syvert Ingebrigtsen-Haugensoy, Rev. Mr. Jacobson Anderson, Johannes Johansen, Soren Bakke and others. Those were busy days in the forests of Muskego in the winter of 1844 when the material for the church was taken out and hauled to the Indian mound on which it was decided that the church should stand, as it was the most commanding site in the settlement. The work was begun five years after the first settler had made his appearance there.

The first clergyman to serve the congregation was of course Rev. C. Clausen. Rev. H. A. Stub preached his first sermon in America within its walls in 1848 and in July, 1898, he celebrated his semi-centennial jubilee as a clergyman in America at Muskego, but it was in the new church.—Minneapolis Journal.

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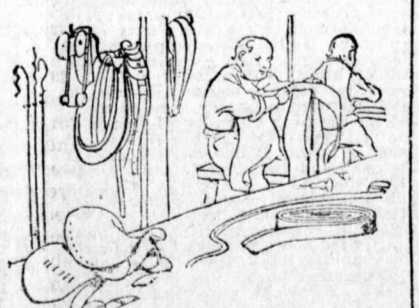
