\$7,000 Paid For Cattle.
The south side of the railroad track presented an animated appearance last Saturday. As a consequence of this money being distributed here on that day, Saturday was a busy one among our business men and considerable of it changed hands in legitimate trade. It is of importance to Fosston to have men who will take hold of this line of business here and make the town a shipping point for these large herds of cattle each year. The most of the money paid out for this stock is again spent in the place.
