

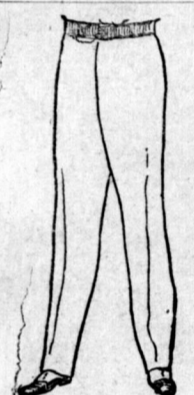

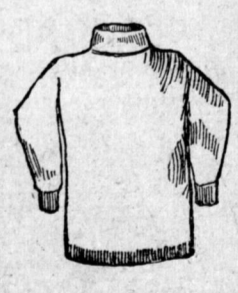

Motion made by J. E. Campbell and seconded by John Hillestad that the water works mains be extended from the corner of Stadsvoild and Central avenues one block east along Stadsvoild avenue, then two blocks north on Larson avenue to eighth street. Carried.

E. D. Barnes and John Hillestad were appointed a committee to make the necessary arrangements for the laying and extension of the mains along the proposed route.
