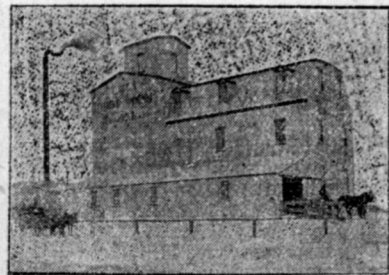

Grand Forks College.

The board of Trustees of the Grand Forks College met at Grand Forks, Aug. 24th. A large number of matters important to the success of the school were discussed. The repairs upon the building, including the steam plant, were inspected. Arrangements were made for the purchase of furniture, and the indications are that everything will be in first class condition at the opening of the college, Oct. 15th.

Thorough courses are offered by the institution in the academic, college preparatory, normal and commercial branches, and in music. It is the intention to make the Grand Forks College one of the best schools of its kind in the West. The principal, Prof. K. A. Kasberg, has had sixteen years experience in this line of school work.

This is the handsome building that was built by the United Church some years ago, at a cost of over \$30,000. It has lately been purchased by the Norwegian Synod Church, which has paid the old debt on the building, added improvements and secured an efficient new corps of teachers.

The expenses are, we think, as low as it is possible to make them in a good school, board for instance, being at actual cost. Repairs have been made upon the building to the extent of \$1,300, and the whole building, from top to bottom is in very good condition, furnished with modern conveniences, and supplied with the city filtered water which is purified from all dangerous ingredients. THE "CREDITOR CLASS."

A Gross Perversion Upon Which Bryan Based an Assault.

The silver orators from Bryan down are never tired of reiterating that the gold standard is established solely in the interest of the creditor class, who want whatever is due them paid in the best and highest kind of money. They assume that the debtor class is the poor who owe money and that the creditor class is the rich to whom money is always due. On this ground they endeavor to foment hatred and bitterness among the poor against the rich and to array class against class and employee against employer. To stir up such jealousies and hatreds opens the road to anarchy, and anarchy leads to the destruction of government.

But it is not true that the poor are the debtor class and the rich the creditor class. As a matter of fact the great majority of people belong to both classes, having money coming to them from one direction and having to pay it out in another. It is therefore difficult to draw any hard and fast line to separate the debtors from the creditors. But if there is a creditor class in this country, a set of people to whom that designation is peculiarly applicable, it is not composed of the men who handle large sums of money and who are engaged in carrying on great enterprises. They for the most part are debtors.

The real creditor class is composed of working men and women, of employees in every walk of business, of salaried people and of depositors in banks, especially depositors in savings banks. These are the men and women to whom money is always due and who are entitled if anybody in all the world is to the best and most stable money that can be devised. A fluctuating money, varying in value from time to time, is to them a condemnation of poverty and loss.

A workman, no matter what his labor may be, who starts to work on Monday morning is a creditor at nightfall for the amount of his day's wages, and at the end of the week he is a creditor for six days' pay. Whether a man works by the day, by the week, by the month or by the year he is always a creditor, for he must give his services first.

But above all it is the savings bank depositor who is the chief of creditors and who in laying by his money for "a rainy day" should when he comes to draw it out have just as good money paid as he deposited. To these creditors who are saving day by day their hard earned wages and salaries Bryanism and 16 to 1 would be disaster, ruin and despair.

The enemy's country is moving westward much faster than the center of population. In four years it has gone from New York to Indiana, and by the end of this year even Nebraska will become the enemy of political fads.

A wonderful old Bible has just been discovered in Venice, the fortunate finder being Leo S. Olschki, a well known antiquary of Florence, says the Boston Transcript. It is in five large volumes and was printed in Rome in the printing house of Don Pietro Massimo, in 1417 and 1472. Soon after it came from the press it was purchased by a patrician family of Venice and it was in the archives of this family that Olschki discovered it. The edition of which it forms a part is exceedingly rare, and very large sums have been paid for imperfect copies of the Bible. Olschki paid 5,400 lire ten years ago for a copy of which two volumes are missing, and a library in Berlin recently asked 13,000 lire for a mutilated copy. The copy just discovered is probably the finest in the world, and 30,000 lire was readily paid for it by a buyer who is supposed to represent a wealthy American.

In ten years the descendants of two rabbits will number 70,000,000.

In Nebraska there are 141 log school-houses, 517 built of sod, one of baled straw and one of steel.

The number of languages and dialects spoken in the world amounts to 3,064.
