## For McKinley and Roosevelt

A Large and Enthusiastic Republican Club Organized in Fosston.

Headquarters Secured and a Campaign Commenced in Earnest.

If the local Bryanites ever had an idea that the Republicans of the town were going to sleep through this campaign they have learned their mistake for the week past has seen a stirring up that if continued will make the Bryan vote a month from now look very weak.

A few days ago several energetic republicans decided that if the democrats could have a club their party should also have an organization and with this end in view started out with lists for willing signers and before many hours secured over a hundred names in town and 134 were listed by the time the meeting was called Tuesday evening.

This meeting was well attended by representative republicans and much enthusiasm over the projected organization was expressed.

The meeting was called to order shortly after 8 o'clock by A. Kaiser, and B. S. Bennett was elected chairman, W. P. Hebard acting as temporary chairman.

The following reliable set of permanent officers were elected:

Executive committee—J. I. Hilles and A. E. Bakke, A. Berg.

By a unanimous vote the club requested A. Kaiser, chairman of the county committee, to insist upon Senator Nelson delivering an evening speech in Fosston if possible before the close of the campaign.

The secretary was authorized to send or a number of campaign song books, and a choir of singers will be formed up in their arrival for the purpose of assisting in public meetings to be held during the coming weeks.

Since the meeting many new names have been added to the club which will reach 150 in a few days.

H. J. Hanson's comfortable building on Stephens avenue has been secured for headquarters and is being appropriately fitted up for use during the coming weeks and is already decorated with a large sign and numerous pictures. Chairs and literature will be provided and public meetings will be held there at stated times.

Next Monday evening, Oct. 8th, W. F. STREET,

## A MODERN HOSPITAL

Drs. McKinnon & Gilmore Will Build a \$5,000 Hospital Building.

The ground was staked out and work commenced on Wednesday of this week upon a hospital building that will be a great improvement to the town and will attract considerable attention from outside points when completed.

The present building used by these experienced doctors and situated in the eastern part of town has proved to be entirely inadequate to accommodate their continually increasing business and the erection of the handsome large hospital now commenced is not being done so much for convenience as from necessity. However, when completed, the new Fosston hospital will be one of the best equipped and most complete institutions of the kind in the Northwest.

The main building will be two stories high, 50x30 feet, the ceilings being 10 feet high in the first story and 9 feet on the second floor. On the west side two ward rooms, 25x21, one above the other, will be built, and on the south a kitchen 24x30, with the hospital dining room, will be attached. A roomy basement will be made under the main building and the stone and brick foundation under the entire building will be 4 feet beneath the surface of the ground and 4 feet above the level.

The front of the main building will be used for the independent consulting rooms and dressing room. In addition to these on the first floor there will be a waiting room, library, private dining room and one of the ward rooms.

The second floor will contain the second ward room, three private patients' rooms, an operating and bath room, with accommodations for nurses and helpers over the kitchen. The two wards will accommodate 24 patients at one time, and the private bedrooms will hold several more.

This entire building will be heated by an improved hot water system and hot and cold water will be supplied through pipes to each room. Many modern appliances, including a first class X ray apparatus, will be introduced and when opened for patients as it will be not later than December 1st, this hospital will be complete in its appointments in every particular and second to none in this part of the country. The doctors will have their offices in the hospital and will therefore be in closer touch with their patients than now and every attention possible will be given to their hospital patrons.

Miss Lebaa, who has in past years so ably superintended the nursing, will again assume the position of head nurse this winter. It is the aim of the doctors to make their hospital one of the best in the state and they will spare no expense to make it such. The work of putting up the building will be rushed through as quickly as possible and when complete it will be a credit to the owners and to the city.

53 pupils are now enrolled in the assembly room.

The following comparisons of our first month's report with that of last year shows some encouraging facts:

First month 1899, total enrolled, 235; No. left school, 1; total days attendance, 3,850; No. days of absence, 200; cases tardiness, 48; per cent of attendance, 93; per cent of tardiness, 3.5; visits from board, B. S. Bennett.

First month 1900, total enrolled, 254; No. left school, 0; total days attendance, 4,500; No. days of absence, 200; cases tardiness, 32; per cent of attendance, 95; per cent of tardiness, 1.3; visits from board, B. S. Bennett.

Thus it will be seen that improvement has been made in almost every particular. The fair interfered with our first month's attendance both years, nevertheless the percentage of attendance has gone up 3 per cent. The tardiness has decreased nearly one-half and the total enrollment for the last month exceeds that of last year by 19. These facts are encouraging and taken with other material improvements, they indicate that the Fosston schools are on a much better foundation than they were a year ago.

Our newly bound books, 46 volumes, arrived this week and will soon occupy their old places on the shelves. They will be called for immediately by our reading boys and girls.

We have burned over two cords of wood this month.

Last Monday afternoon the first lip of "Gallia est omnis divisa in partes Ares" was heard from the tenth grade Latin class. That means they are reading Caesar.

Republican Speeches.

Capt. L. S. Nelson, the popular Republican speaker, will address the voters in several places in this vicinity next week.

All of these meetings will be held in the evening at 8 o'clock and a liberal attendance is expected at every one of them. Capt. Nelson will speak in either English or Norwegian.
