Who will Speak in Opera House at One O'clock P.M. Barbecue at Noon

We hold Porto Rico by the same title as the Philippines. The treaty of peace which ceded us the one conveyed to us the other. AN EXPENSIVE LEGISLATURE.

To the Fusion legislature of 1891 we must look, therefore, for the promised reforms and reform measures. The act of this legislature which brought the value of "Reform" home most clearly to the people of Minnesota was the raising of the tax levy rate from 17-10 mills, as levied by the legislature of 1889, to 22-10 mills, an increase of 5-10 of a mill. The amount levied by the 1889 legislature for the state revenue purposes was \$2,350,000 for the two years of 1889 and 1890. The amount levied by the 1891 legislature for the two years of 1891 and 1892 was \$2,545,000.—R. C. Dunn's Milaca Speech.
