ENTRANCE HALLS.

How to Bring Out the Artistic and Hide the Prosaic.

The entrance hall is not a place for the display of coats and hats and a heterogeneous mass of boots and shoes, umbrellas and walking sticks. Alas, even in these days of progress and artistic training there are many which remind one of nothing so much as an old clothes shop directly one enters the front door.

In order to insure as much light as possible have the paint work ivory white. Should there be plenty of windows, dark or olive green might be employed.

Should you wish to increase the apparent size of the entrance hall, this can be effected by a judicious arrangement of curtains, some veiling the staircase, others depending from the usual archlike adornment so often to be found in present day houses and for which we should be becomingly grateful.

When these are conspicuous by their absence, it is advisable to invest in one of those white wood fixtures which are so light and artistic in construction that the transformation effected is nothing short of marvelous. From this must be suspended serge or chenille curtains which accord harmoniously with the wall paper. There must be a pretty white wood table, while in preference to chairs I would suggest a cabinet, which may be merely a cabinet trunk, the lid covered with a large cushion and the whole upholstered in bright cretonne. One or two frilled cushions must rest against the wall. As a receptacle for the umbrellas, etc.,

of callers there might be a china stand, but this must not be a prominent feature.

A standard or hanging lamp, a palm or two will complete the furniture, while the walls must be further adorned with a few good engravings in white frames, a white framed mirror and a small hanging bookshelf in white wood to contain time tables, etc. Should dark oak be chosen for the woodwork, old oak furniture would take the place of the white.

It is in the rear of the hall that we must discover some place for the bestowal of the masculine overcoats should the master of the house consider it necessary to his happiness to keep his outdoor garments down stairs.

If there be no recess of an accommodating nature, doubtless a corner may be found which can be fitted with a triangular piece of board and screened by a serge curtain, behind which the coats and hats may hang in peace.

Close by must stand a combined seat and boot cupboard. This may be easily made by a carpenter or roughly improvised from an empty case.



Concerning Orders.

It is said, writes M. Prescott in Good Housekeeping—

That a generous lump of washing soda and a quart of water, if put into pots and pans in which fish, cabbage, onions and other "loud" smelling foods have been cooked, will thoroughly cleanse and make them smell sweet and clean.

That a teaspoonful of vinegar boiling on the stove will counteract the smell of strong food.

That a teaspoonful of ground cloves on a few hot coals will produce the same result.

That a few drops of oil of sandalwood dropped on a hot shovel is also an excellent deodorizer.

That a stale crust of bread boiled with cabbage will absorb the strong odor.

That a large lump of charcoal in a refrigerator will prevent a musty smell.

That a pound of coppers dissolved in boiling water, if poured into drain pipes, will dissolve the grease and carry away all impurities.

That a disagreeable "onion breath" may be got rid of by swallowing a mouthful of vinegar or drinking a half cup of hot water in which a pinch of baking soda has been dissolved.

That a foul breath may be sweetened by a mouth wash of permanganate of potash in a teaspoon of water.

That the frequent use of lye in the kitchen sink will prevent a horrible odor.

That a few mouthfuls of lime water or a few drops of tincture of myrrh in a tumbler of water will sweeten a bad breath, and a small piece of orris root, if chewed, will give a violet odor to the breath.

Apple Fritters.

Core three apples, cut across the center in one-third inch slices. Pare, lay out on a platter and sprinkle with powdered sugar, lemon juice and spice. Drain, dip each slice in fritter batter and fry a few at a time in hot deep fat. Drain and serve with cream and sugar or lemon sauce.

Onion Soup.

Melt a piece of butter the size of an egg; slice into it a medium sized onion and fry a delicate brown. Add three gills of milk and one of cream. Season to taste with pepper and celery salt. Split three or four Boston crackers, put in a tureen, and over them strain the hot milk.
