A choice sample of rice, grown upon land in that vicinity was received at this office by mail a few days ago that bears Mr. McManus' shipping tag which conveys the intelligence that the farm upon which it was grown yielded 11 barrels of rice to the acre and that the owner realized \$3.50 per barrel from the crop.
