Ashley Porter felt the signs of childbirth at her Ellinwood home early in the morning last June 18th. She planned to give birth to her third child at Hutchinson Hospital, so she and her husband, Tyler, got in the car and headed east. By Chase, Porter knew she was not going to make it all the way. She had never been to Rice County District Hospital, but she knew it existed; that was enough.

Porter, like many other women and families, had a positive birthing experience with the compassionate staff of doctors and nurses at the Family Birth Center. She was very impressed with the quality of care she received. "The doctor came right in," Porter remembered. "They were really up on what they were doing.'

Birthing suites at the Family Birth Center were updated in 2009 with the hospital renovation. Labor, delivery and recovery all take place in a spaquired for first time mothers giving birth at RCDH and are open to the community. Women are encouraged to share the experience by bringing a support person.

The quality of care provided at the Family Birth Center was recently reported in a survey sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Rice County District Hospital's quality practice score was 75, compared to a 62 percentile average in the United States. This survey recognizes the Family Birth Center as not only one of the best facilities in Kansas, but across the country. The survey considered labor and delivery care, feeding of breastfed infants, breastfeeding assistance, contact between mother and infant, facility discharge care, staff training, and structural and organizational aspects of care delivery.

Family practice physicians welcome infants into the world and continue to provide care as families grow. Physicians on staff for obstetrics and gynecology are Dr. Tom Plumeri at Lyons Medical Center, and Drs. Kristina Darnauer, Stacy Dashiell, and James Decker at Sterling Medical Center. Doctors and nurses guide mothers through the labor and delivery process and epidurals are available if desired. Patients and families who choose to utilize local healthcare services continue to be pleased with the convenience and personalized care they receive. Every effort is made to help a family's birthing experience be everything they want it to be. "There was just something about the atmosphere," Porter remembers. She now recommends the Family Birth Center to others who are expecting a new child. "When patients come to my window they can trust I am there to help them," Arriola said. "Being attentive to them is helpful.

"It is helpful to me to give thanks to God every day and to share with others through my words and my actions. Offering a smile or making them smile

helps break the tension and takes away their concerns and worry."

She said during the recent transition between the clinic and the hospital, she kept her faith that everything would all work out. Others worried whether or not they would have a job. Sometimes changes like this are for the best for everyone involved. Keeping the faith is healthier.

Arriola said she looks forward to going to work every day. In her free time, she is a certified Zumba instructor at Iron Works and loves to cook Guatemalan-type food and spend time with her family.
