Robert Behnke-Activity Director Swingbed Rice County District Hospital It doesn't get any better than this!

If Robert Behnke could pick his dream job, it would be the one he has today as activity director at Rice County District Hospital Swingbed. His journey began in 1994 when he and wife Carolyn made frequent visits to the hospital to visit his father who was a patient there

for nine months. Following his death in 1995, they continued to volunteer, Carolyn assisting the activity director, Jeanette Christiansen, and Behnke playing the piano.

"Every time we visited I enjoyed myself and the stresses from farming disappeared," Behnke said.

In 2002 he made the deci-

sion to put those stresses behind him and enrolled in a CNA class at Hoisington Hospital, working one-on-one with a patient during his training.

Behnke rented the farm to his cousin Mike, completed CNA training in June, finished his last wheat harvest and started working at the hospital a week later on the second of July. He said it wasn't until he completed a spiritual gifts class that he realized everything happening to him was meant to be.

While he and Carolyn were volunteering in the late 90s, the patients talked to him about changes they would like to see: a handicap ramp and a separate place to eat and have activities. As a volunteer, he presented their list to the hospital board.

"Not having a handicap ramp is frightening to the patients," Behnke

told board members. "They would also like to have a separate room where they can eat and have planned activities."

Bob Mullen, hospital administrator, gave Behnke a list of possible donors and told him if he could raise the money, they would build it. With a goal of \$250,000 and a donor letter com-

posed with the help of Dorothy Behnke, he set out to accomplish the impossible.

"I'll never forget that day," Behnke said. "It was a Sunday morning. I had just finished my chores and Carolyn told me to call Dutch Bolton. He had received the letter and wanted to donate the entire \$250,000 in honor of his living wife."

When the position for swingbed activity director opened up, Behnke was encouraged to apply.

"I never thought one day I would be working at the RCDH Bolton Activity Center," Behnke said. "I love my job, the activities and communicating with the residents. We have fun together.

'We're closer in age and can relate," he said. "I didn't go to a one-room school but I did my student teaching in one."

Behnke and the residents often reminisce about historical events and their lives. Each day ends in the activity room with a game of dominoes. When he's in charge, every day is a new adventure, every holiday a celebration in 3-D and living color. Behnke said he often thinks about retirement, knowing it's inevitable.

"That's going to be the hardest thing," he said. "I may have to put it off until I'm in a wheelchair with them."
