"My brother was born with congenital cataracts," said McClure. "The idea to pursue this field sounded good to me at the time."

She received a bachelor's degree from Sterling College and worked a total of 11 years, on and off, for Dr. Larry Young, a Hutchinson optometrist, and in an ophthalmologist office as a scrub tech.

"I was too afraid to go the distance," McClure said.

In May 2004, she left a position with Hutchinson Medical Center to return to her roots, taking a position at the Sterling Clinic as medical assistant for Dr. Tom Simpson.

"I knew Dr. Simpson and his assistant, Diane Wilson, who had been with him forever," Mc-Clure said. "I didn't have any medical schooling, just on-the-job training working in the medical office environment.

"I was lucky Dr. Simpson took a chance with me," she said.

She currently works as a medical assistant for James Decker, DO at Sterling Medical Center.

Every day is different and that's one of the reasons she likes her job so much.


Working with babies to the elderly make her job challenging. "I might be taking a temperature one minute and removing a lesion the next," McClure said.

"There will always be illnesses," said Mc-Clure, who also assists when there is an injury or procedure to be done.

Her job also includes checking in patients, refilling prescriptions, assisting patients who need shots or immunizations and taking phone calls.

Because all patient medical records are now electronic, it takes more of the doctor's time. A triage nurse was hired to help intercept calls, allowing more time for doctor/patient time. If triage can't answer the request, the matter is referred to the doctor.

McClure is married and currently has no children. She works Monday through Friday and open to helping out at other times when needed. McClure said it isn't uncommon to find her back at work on her day




"People travel to the clinic from all over the area," McClure said.
"Because we are a small office, we get to know our patients on a personal level. I know who my patients are, where they come from and what they are all about. Sometimes that can be a sad thing, especially when a patient I've become attached to dies."

"I love the people I work with," McClure said. "I'm looking forward to being here for a long time."

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
