using electricity.

According to current CEO Bill Prather, the first subscribers joined the cooperative for \$5, a vast sum in post-Depression rural America; the amount in today's dollars would be \$82. The cost per kilowatt hour in 1939 was 8 cents; today, cooperative members pay 10.8 cents per kilowatt hour.

Farmers RECC linemen set a utility pole during the early years of the cooperative. In 1939 alone, linemen constructed 375 miles of service infrastructure.
