The Tiny Toilers 4-H Club was first organized in June 15, 1933, at the home of Bernice Keast as a 4-H Girls Sewing Club called Tiny Boosters. On January 4, 1934, John Kline helped reorganize the club to include both boys and girls. They met in the basement of the Tiny Church and changed the name to Tiny Toilers. They were given Charter #783 on December 6, 1934, with 31 Charter members. Mrs. Ivan Reat was the leader.

The club has had 5 National Project Winners as well as 46 State Winners in 52 projects. The club has won numerous Safety and Health Awards. As a top winner in safety one year, taking ten members and leaders to a Safety Conference in Wichita.

We have had 11 County Alumni Awards winners from our club with two, Donald Degee and Jim Forrest, as state 4-H Alumni Winners. Three 4-H members, Donald Degee, Jim Forrest, and Janet Skelton, went on to become Community Leaders of the Tiny Toilers 4-H Club.

Our club received three grants to clean up, mow the grounds, and paint the L'Dora School House at the Santa Fe Trail Center.

The Tiny Toilers has always been a very active club, receiving gold seals every year. Six families have hosted I.F.Y.E.'s (International Farm Youth Exchange). Members in the following activities: Who's Who Magazine; Citizenship Short Course in Washington D.C.; Judging - Livestock, Meats, and Home Economics at State Fair, Hays, and Kansas City; "I Dare You" Award; Camps - Health and Safety, Junior Leadership, Conservation, Music; 4-H Roundup; Discovery Days; Camp at Rock Springs; and Exchange with other states.

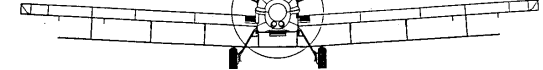
