owner and operator of the business, recalled the establishment's early beginnings.

Past Local Funeral Directors

Mr. Dilday states that brothers Jim (Dilday's grandfather) and Press Bowlin opened Bowlin Funeral Home in 1915 in the Jewell Community located east of Dresden. In 1918, the siblings relocated their business on the corner of Wilson and East Main Street.

Mr. Winston and Mr. Jones formed a partnership with the Bowlin Brothers in 1919 and the business was renamed Winston-Jones & Bowlin Brothers Funeral Home. Later, Jones moved to Martin and the Bowlin brothers remained in Dresden.

In 1926, Press Bowlin's son, Carman Bowlin, attended Gupton-Jones Mortuary School in Nashville, and the funeral home began embalming after this time.

In 1935, S.P. Bowlin, son of Jim Bowlin, attended the mortuary school and took over the business.

M.F. "Ferrin" Riggs became a partner in 1938, and it was renamed Bowlin & Riggs Funeral Home.

After S.P. Bowlin got married, his wife, Edith, served as funeral director.

The business operated under that name until 1958, when Riggs sold out and the name reverted to Bowlin Funeral Home.

In 1959, Jimmy Dilday became the funeral director and embalmer.

In 1968, the funeral parlor moved to its current location at 279 West Main Street.

In 1972, Dilday became a full partner. He then purchased the business in 1977, and decided to continue the longstanding tradition and kept Bowlin Funeral Home as the name of the business in honor of its 101 years of operation.

Also featured will be Anderson Funeral Home, owned and operated by Joe Anderson, which was located on Hwy 22 across from Kountry Korner in the 1960s and 1970s. According to Co-chairman Judge

Tommy Moore, re-enactors will portray many of the above-mentioned individuals associated with Bowlin Funeral Home, as well as Joe Anderson. Other funeral directors will be mentioned but will not be portrayed by re-enactors.

The current staff at Bowlin Funeral Home includes: Mr. Dilday as president; Scotty Brewer, preneed funeral agent/funeral director/ embalmer; and Ronnie Sellers, funeral director/embalmer.

Bowlin Funeral Home was selected by the Weakley County Chamber of Commerce as the 2015 Business of the Year.
