Mt. Pisgah Lutheran Ch. hosts party to honor outstanding local student

On August 4th, members of the Mt. Pisgah Lutheran Church gathered at the Wynnshire Ridge Clubhouse in Hickory to celebrate the achievements of one very special young person, Emily Mawyer. At 16, Emily has been a student of the Alexander County School System and is an active member of the Mt. Pisgah Youth program, but is now getting ready to head off on a new adventure. Emily is one of only two students from ACHS accepted into the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, and is the only student from Alexander County that will be attending the residential program.

Renee Mawyer, Emily's mother, is very proud of her daughter and is excited for this opportunity for her. She says, "Emily is inclined to be successful in everything, she is very competitive and always tries to be the best at everything she does." Mawver adds, "I was worried, when considering her future, that she might be disadvantaged somewhat, because AC is a small, rural county, but my husband, Anthony, was quick to point out that it isn't something to be concerned about, because Emily is a product of Alexander County school system, so they are obviously doing right by the young people."

There really can be no doubt about that – Emily's record in Beta Club (An

organization whose purpose is "to promote the ideals of academic achievement, character, leadership and service among elementary and secondary school students. Source: www.betaclub.org) speaks for itself. She was a member at ACHS and placed first in Math 1 at the District Competition which was held Wilkesboro and first in Math 1 at the State convention in Greensboro, February 5th - 6th. The National Convention was held in New Orleans, LA, June 27th -30th, and she placed 8th in the nation in the Math 1 Competition there. Mawyer states emphatically, "Emily challenges herself to excel, but she has also benefited by having some very excellent teachers at ACHS."

Leslie Barger, Honors Chemistry teacher at ACHS maintains, "Emily is a truly gifted student, and it was an honor to have her in my Honors Chemistry class. She excelled in every aspect of the class while maintaining an average well over 100 for the entire semester. She exemplifies everything that the NC School of Science and Mathematics looks for in a student. Emily is extremely intelligent, highly self-motivated, and exceptionally personable. These attributes, along with her highly developed critical thinking skills, make Emily an outstanding student."

Emily's Freshman English teacher, Ann Herman, remembers Emily fondly, "Emily is such a

phenomenal, dynamic, well-rounded student who I think will achieve great things. She's one of the smartest students I have ever taught. Emily has an insight that few students have, and a wisdom about her that is well beyond her years. Often, you will get that from students who are more gifted with literature and the arts, but they don't have that gift with math and science. She is one of most gifted and intelligent people I've ever known. It so rare to find all of those attributes together, and to also find such a Christian heart." "Often," Herman asserted, "when you have someone who is so talented, you find a huge ego, but Emily doesn't have an ounce of that, she is a humble spirit."

Students attending NCSSM are selected during their 10th-grade year through a competitive process that considers each applicant's interest in science and mathematics, and includes a review of standardized test scores, past academic performance, special talents, accomplishments, and extracurricular interests. Students' essays and their current schools' assessments of student characteristics also help present a complete picture of each candidate.

Barger continues, "In addition to being academically talented, Emily is also talented in many other areas; [she dances, loves music and plays the piano]. She is kind-hearted and always willing to assist her peers in any way she can. She is also very creative, enjoys being challenged, and will flourish at NCSSM. She will be successful in anything she does in life. Emily is a very special young lady, and I extend my congratulations and best wishes to her!"

Emily's journey to Durham does not just leave a hole in the heart of her family and teachers in the Alexander School District; she leaves her entire dance studio missing her. Donna Harrington, Owner of Ms. Donna's School of Dance here in Taylorsville, explains, "Emily began her dance training when she was three years old, and has always loved to dance. She dances Tap, Ballet, Jazz, and Lyrical forms. She is an exceptional dance student and gets along with every student in all of her classes. Emily always has great ideas and is very creative, yet is completely respectful to her teachers. We are a small school, but do not just teach dance, we try to teach morals and Christian values. She is very ambitious and always goes beyond what is expected and has won the "Dancer of the

Year" award."


"As a matter of fact," Harrington reveals, "we think so much of her, that we are planning an additional 22 hour class specifically for the exact weekends when Emily is home throughout the upcoming school year, just so we can have Emily continue in our school. Everyone of her other dance classmates want to attend this class just to work with Emily.

Dance is not the only performing art that Emily excels at either... Celia Sexton, Emily's second long-term piano teacher (Robin Land Reid, owner of Miss Robin Reid's Studio in Taylorsville, was her first) declares, "I am just thrilled that she has this opportunity to go to the NCSSM, because she is probably one of the most gifted young people I have taught. I don't know that I have ever had a student quite that mature, both academically and musically. In the three years I have worked with her it was quite apparent she practiced diligently. She is very committed to anything she works on and is quite amazing. I have never had a student who thrived on the practice and discipline that performing arts require to excel. She is so

self-motivated!" Emily left for NCSSM on August 13th and is on her path towards her new journey. At her goodbye party, Pastor Mike Stone, of Mt. Pisgah Lutheran Church, tried to sum up everyone's impression of Emily - "Emily is a one of the brightest, most sincerely genuine, and articulate teenager I have ever met. She is so capable in math and the sciences, and still has the artistic gift of playing piano and dancing. Her compassion, evidenced in her deeply rooted faith, is by far the most endearing of her many qualities. We will miss her being so active with our youth but are so proud of her and excited to see all that God has in store




