JEREMY FORTNER

A lifelong resident of Alexander County, Jeremy Fortner is a 1996 graduate of Alexander Central High School. While at Alexander Central, Fortner was a standout, three-sport athlete, participating in foot-

ball, basketball, and baseball for four years.

His basketball career at Alexander Central is one of the most decorated in the school's history. A four-year letterman for Coaches Dale Yount and Ron Hargrave, Fortner was a two-time Co-Player of the Year in the NW Conference and became the first Cougar player to surpass the 1,000 point mark in scoring. Fortner earned team Most Valuable Player honors three times and shared League Player of the Year honors following the 1995 and 1996 seasons. He was an All-Conference performer in all three sports while at ACHS. As a quarterback at ACHS, he led the Unifour area in passing his senior season for the Cougars.

Following high school, the all-time leading male scorer in school history signed a college basketball scholarship to attend Tusculum University in Greenville, Tennessee. While at Tusculum, Fortner was named the South Atlantic Conference's Scholar Athlete of the Year in 2000.

He currently works as an accountant at Martin Starnes and Associates in Taylorsville. After college, he has been very active in civic and community organizations. He also serves as a coach in the county's recreational leagues.

Jeremy and his wife, Jill, are the parents of two children and reside in the Ellendale Community of Alexander County.

CHARLES RICKEY SHERRILL

A 1964 graduate of Taylorsville High School, Charles Rickey Sherrill was a four-sport high school athlete and later became a standout football player in college and the Marine Corps. honors for the Bears during his career. As a senior, Sherrill was voted the team captain and earned a spot in the Lions' Bowl for top high school players.

In 1965, Sherrill enrolled at Appalachian State University and earned a spot on the football team as a walk-on in the spring. By the regular season in the fall of 1965, Sherrill had earned a starting spot on the Mountaineer defense at linebacker. During three seasons in Boone, Sherrill started 29 of 30 games, and led ASU in tackles in 1966 and 1967.

He graduated from ASU in 1968 and entered the United States Marine Corps in 1970. Sherrill spent 21 years in the Marine Corps before retiring to enter the education field. In 1980, Sherrill was presented the Leftwich Leadership Award, which is awarded to one US Marine annually. He also earned the Meritorious Service Award, the Navy/Marine Corps Commendation Medal, the Navy/Marine Achievement Medal, and the Vietnam Service Medal with Star, and numerous other honors.

His decorated playing career at ASU, coupled with his Marine Corps career resulted in Sherrill being presented with the Appalachian State Distinguished Alumni Award in 1989.

Following his retirement from the Marines in 1991 as a Lieutenant Colonel, Sherrill entered the education field and received two more degrees from Appalachian State University (Masters of Arts, 1995 and Education Specialist, 2000).

Sherrill served as an assistant principal, principal, athletic director, assistant superintendent, and superintendent in North Carolina Schools from 1993 until retiring in 2010. He served as the Superintendent of Schools in Pamlico County from 2005 until 2008 and closed his career as an educator as the Associate Superintendent of Schools in Burke County from 2008 until 2010. In all, Sherrill spent 21 years in the Marine Corps and 21 years in NC Schools before retiring from each occupation.

Sherrill and his wife, Bonita, recently returned to Alexander County and are currently living on Lake



ROBERT VAN TARLTON Robert Van Tarlton was born in Concord, North Carolina and lived in Cabarrus County until traveling to Lenoir-Rhyne College on a football scholarship in 1951. He was a standout football and baseball player at Mt. Pleasant High School which paved the way for him to become a member of the football and baseball programs at LRC.

He was one of the leaders on the LRC team which captured the North State Conference Championship over Elon in 1952.

During his days at Lenoir-Rhyne, Tarlton first visited Taylorsville to play with the Taylorsville Town Baseball Team following his freshman year. The team was coached by the legendary Hanley Painter. He later played with the Taylorsville Town Team in the Blue Ridge Semi-Pro League of the Catawba Valley and was the leading vote-getter in the All-Star Game. In 1953, Tarlton led the LRC team in batting with a .426 average as the Bears again claimed the conference championship.

In 1953, he was signed to a professional baseball contract with the Cincinnati Reds. From there, he played in several minor league cities before giving up baseball to enter the education field as a teacher and coach at Hiddenite High School. Tarlton taught the eighth grade boys' class at Hiddenite and assisted Coach Gene Bost in basketball and base-

He also served on the Alexander County Hospital Board of Directors and was a member of the first-ever Athletic Boosters Club at Alexander Central High School.

In addition to his civic and community involvement in Alexander County since 1952, Tarlton has served as a youth baseball coach and sponsored one of the strongest women's softball teams in Alexander County history.
