Junior Levon Swenson and sophomore Peyton Harvey return as varsity letter winners from last year, and Renken expects sophomores Jordan Moffett and Bryce Sears to have an increased role in 2016.

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for them this year," he said. "They've both really improved over the summer and the first two or three weeks of practice. Fortunately, they don't need a whole lot of mechanical help. It's just fine-tuning a couple things then turning them loose and letting them do their thing."

Ewing and Sjogren will be joined by three freshmen in Myles Menges, Bryce Baker, and John Billinger. Alefs said his squad will likely not compete as a varsity squad for many of the meets but he may fill a complete roster at home meets on April 21 and May 10. Menges may get some varsity time in other meets.

Ellinwood will host the Central Prairie League meet on May 10, and Alefs is excited to have all those teams come to town.

"It's going to be interesting with the crisscrosses and the shorter course," he said. "It's fun we'll be able to host the league meet because I was a junior in 1996, we hosted a regional in Ellinwood. It will kind of be like a replay of having a regional meet in Ellinwood, it being a different kind of course. It will be interesting to see how the players react to it."

That 1996 season was a big one for Alefs. As a iunior at EHS, he won the Class 3A individual state golf title that year. Growing up down the street from the golf course in Great Bend, Alefs began playing competitively around age six, and was part of Steve Gotsche's first junior golf program. After graduating from EHS, Alefs went on to play golf at Bethany College under Jon Daniels.

"He's probably one of the reasons I wanted to get into coaching," Alefs said. "With my grandpa (Jack Bowman) and my mom (Jackie Cook), that's kind of been bred into me. My golf coach at Bethany was a big reason I wanted to coach kids."

Alefs also played basketball for the Eagles and returned as an assistant coach for two years through 2012. As a first-time head coach, he wants his established players to continue their success but now has the role of keeping the program alive after they graduate. He hopes to host a summer clinic to get more young kids interested.

"I want to see the two seniors go out with a bang and hopefully have a successful year," he said. "We've talked about whether they want to continue their golfing careers and, if they do, trying to get them recruited by junior colleges or small colleges

"As far as the younger kids, we're looking for a solid building foundation for something to continue on. We don't want the program to go away so we're trying to draw as much interest as we can.'

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pitcher and catcher, and sophomore Bryan Pina is expected to see some varsity time.

Kirkhart has many players penciled in as possibilities at second base, and the team has spent the first weeks of practice trying to secure a solid defense.

"Second base is where we're not locked in," Kirkhart said. "We have three or four guys still trying to be consistent. We have three or four outfielders we feel good about, it will just be who can we get into second base."

Kirkhart always preaches putting the ball in play. This year, with some much speed on the roster, that will be emphasized once again, especially since the Kansas City Royals proved small ball can win.

"They don't do it with home runs," Kirkhart said of the Royals. "We're not a home-run hitting team. They utilize their speed, they play small ball, they put the ball in play and make things happen, and they play good defense. We have the tools for all of that. Now it's just a matter of finding some consistent pitching.

"We need pitchers to get the mindset to go out and compete and win. That's what we lost last year with Grady, Mitchell, Jake, and even Dakota. When they took the mound, there was the confidence they could go out there and compete and get guys out. We have some talented pitchers – some guys who can pitch – now it's just a matter of going out and throwing strikes and giving us a chance to make plays."

Winning the CKL is always a priority in Lyons. Last year, Larned won the title and took an 18-3 record to state. The Indians won a game and led Concordia 4-1 late in the semifinals but let it slip away. Because of rain delays, no consolation game was played. The Indians are expected to be the top competition in the CKL again as Isiah Perez and Evan Skelton return after shutting out opponents in the regular season last year.

"Our mindset is we play to win league," said Kirkhart. "We won league two years in a row. Last year, we tried to convince the kids now that they have a target on their back they have to be able to go out and play. We just slipped. Larned had a really good team last year and they've got most of those kids back. That's going to be the forerunner."

Several of this year's players did see Perez over the summer. They were able to scratch out an 8-run inning against the ace.

"Anything can happen," Kirkhart said. "It started with a base hit and an error. It started with the way the Royals play, capitalizing on opportunities. Once it gets going, you get the next guy up and all of a sudden you hit one in the gap."
