Plenty of new faces to make mark for Central Plains football squad

By MIKE COURSON Undefeated state champions in 2014, and a squad ranked No. 1 most of 2015, last year's graduating class helped the Central Plains football team to a 24-2 record over the past two seasons. Both of those loses came last year, and both came against state champions in Victoria and Spearville.

With just four offensive and three defensive starters back Oiler Coach Chris Steiner now has to fill some big shoes.

"We have to stay healthy," he said. "We want to continue to improve each week and win games on both sides of the football. We need some young kids to step up to fill some positions and create depth that was depleted by graduation."

The list of missing players and their accolades is extensive. Braedan Crites was a standout quarterback and defensive back. Hunter Ingham was a first-team all-league defensive back. Trustin Kreft was a unanimous first-team all-league selection on the offensive line, and ranked No. 9 among sacks in 8-man last year. Cody Price was an allleague linebacker and ranked No. 16 in tackles among 8-man players.

The list continues. Michael Ryan was a first-team all-league defensive lineman and a notable tight end. As kicker, he was a big piece of the Oiler special teams. Jacob Warnken was a first-team allleague linebacker and second-team all-league utility back. Brady Rugan was an all-league honorable mention out of the backfield.

Sophomore Devin Ryan will get the nod at quarterback. A standout basketball and tennis player his freshman year, Ryan (5-11, 148) had limited touches on offense last year with just three four pass tries and three carries. Defensively, Ryan returns to the cornerback position

where he had 21 tackles and three interceptions last year.

Junior Dalton Beck and sophomore Alex Hickel will lead the ground attack. Beck (5-9, 160) carried the ball 11 times for 22 yards and a score last year.

Junior Alex Barton (6-3, 177) returns as a big target for Ryan. Last season, Barton was second on the team with 17 receptions for 246 yards and five touchdowns. Senior Bryce Miller (5-10, 142) caught nine passes for 103 yards and a pair of touchdowns last season.

Senior Trey Schulte (6-0, 224) and junior Phillip Donecker (6-1, 182) will play on the offensive line with senior

James Radenberg (5-11, 248) at center. Sophomore Brett Liebl (6-2, 177) gets the nod at tight end.

Defense has been a staple for the Oilers in recent seasons. Last fall, Central Plains blanked six opponents and held four more to two touchdowns or less. Only eventual state champion Spearville was able to score more than two touchdowns.

Steiner will be missing most of his defensive line and linebackers from a year ago. Schulte returns with 72 tackles and one sack last year.

Barton and Ryan return to the secondary. Barton had 78 tackles, three interceptions, and seven pass deflection

Macksville football continues uphill climb in 2016

In his first year as coach in 2014, the South Gray standout took over the Mustang program at the bottom of a three-year skid, when the Mustangs scored just 12 points all season.

The point production ballooned last season to 112, but that's not enough to win consistently in the eight-man dominant Central Prairie League. The Mustangs did record a 36-14 win against Stafford County rival St. John, to finish 1-8 on the season and 1-4 in their Class 2A district.

This season, Skinner is hoping that 2015 transfer Jacob Rein, now a 6-1. 155-pound junior, will do for the Mustang gridders what he did for the basketball team last winter and the track program in the spring.

As a newcomer to the Mustang football roster, Rein "is a good athlete that will look to help stretch the field at the quarterback position," Skinner said.

Skinner noted that cross country dual sporters Karson Waters, a sophomore, and Brigdon Russell, a two-year veteran harrier as a junior, will give Rein a couple legs up each toward the Mustangs' passing game as receivers.

The rest of the Mustangs' success in 2016 relies "on the returning players," Skinner noted. "We have a solid core group of guys that have been starters for multiple years now. 
