Moody told the *Herald* earlier this semester that she was humbled to be chosen by Csaszar, but not surprised at all that her former student was selected for the award.

"Shelby was always in pursuit of perfection within the classroom," said Moody, who now teaches at McLain Attendance Center. "She had an internal motivation to do nothing less than her best. She is a hard worker and worthy of the STAR Student award.'

"I was humbled that Shelby recognized me as her most influential teacher. But, being recognized pales in comparison to knowing that I influenced her in a positive way."

STAR students are selected on the basis of academic excellence. Both ACT scores and scholastic averages are compared to determine the school's STAR Student, explained Vickie Powell of Jackson, Vice President, Foundation Programs.

"The STAR program encourages and promotes academic achievement among Mississippi's high school seniors," Powell said.

Over 500 STAR Students and STAR Teachers received recognition from MEC's Swayze Foundation at the celebration. The top 20 STAR Students - the ALL-STAR Scholars - and their STAR

Teachers will be presented scholarship awards provided by the Kelly Gene Cook, Sr. Charitable Foundation. The highlight of the Education Celebration will be the naming of the Mississippi ALL-STAR Student for 2012-2013 school year, winner of the coveted \$24,000 Cook Foundation scholarship.

Additional local support for the STAR program is provided by MEC members from communities across the state.
