Optimism abounds as new look Wildcats try to get back to pinnacle of MHSAA football

longtime County coach Johnny Ainsworth announced back in March he was retiring after over two decades at the helm, school officials knew they had a daunting task in finding his replacement. After interviewing several candidates, former Wildcat offensive coordinator Mike King with Mike as our coach and

was chosen for the task. At the time, the consensus among administrators was that King's passion and energy level would be difference makers.

Two games into King's inaugural season that appears to be the case. The Wildcats defeated a good West Lauderdale team 12-0 in the season opener and claimed the Battle for the Bell last Friday with a thrilling 14-13 win over rival George County. The Cats are 2-0 for the first time since 2013 and the players (and the Wildcat faithful) appear "allin" on the direction King and his coaching staff have the program headed.

It is just the scenario GCHS Principal Scott Bray had hoped for when he recommended King for the job.

"I told our school board back in March that Mike King was the right guy for Greene County High School," GCHS Principal Scott Bray said." "I was 100 percent convinced at that time and he has done nothing but build on that confidence. I am excited about are," King said. "It has been what our kids are experiencing up to us to facilitate that and

the results so far speak for themselves."

"When you are faced with replacing someone like Johnny Ainsworth, you look for passion, energy and excitement and our coaching staff is bringing that to the table every day."

King was the offensive coordinator for Ainsworth and the Wildcats for four seasons (2010-2013) before going back to his hometown to take the same position with George County. He credits Ainsworth with helping him grow in his coaching career and said in March that it was an honor to "carry the torch" Ainsworth lit at GCHS.

King hit the ground running in the spring, fulfilling his commitment at George County during school hours then making the daily trek up Hwy. 63 to work with his new team. The excitement and energy level was contagious from the beginning and continues to build.

"It was clear from the beginning how hungry these players guide them in that direction."

was buying into the plan.

"It is cliché, but we are getting great leadership, particularly from our seniors, and it is as sincere as it can be," King said. "From day one we've preached that we don't want to show fear, fatigue or frustration and that is where the leadership is coming in. We've got guys that are stepping up and helping us reinforce those principals and helping pick up their teammates and push each other."

"We don't really have that superstar type player, but we've been blessed with tough, hard-working Greene County boys that are giving us all they have to give."

While King said the wins have not come as a surprise, he can't say the same about the manner in which his team has won.


"You know, I've been an offensive guy from day one, but to see us winning with hawkish defense is great," King said. "We've been consistent on defense through both of the first two games and are constantly improving and learning something new on offense.'

"We have a lot of room to continue to grow, but I am pretty pleased with where we are at this point."

While inexperience is an issue all over the field for GCHS, the Wildcats have played with a lot of confidence. The week one win over West Lauderdale was by no


