More than 150 finish Annual Lake Hickory Triathlon July 22

The Alexander County Family YMCA hosted the 7th Annual Lake Hickory Triathlon on Saturday, July 22 at Dusty Ridge Park. The event, which featured 154 finishers from all over

North Carolina and nearby states, included a 400-yard swim, 16-mile bicycle ride, and a 5K run.

The top three overall finishers in the 7th Annual Lake Hickory Triathlon included: Jake Baugher, age 17 of Mooresville, 1st place with a total time of 1:07:18; Kevin Parks, age 29 of Charlotte, 2nd place at 1:07:31; and Jared Eytcheson, age 18 of Cary, 3rd place at 1:08:25.

The top three female finishers in the 7th Annual Lake Hickory Triathlon included: Olivia Romine, age 17 of Greensboro, 17th overall with a total time of 1:20:10; Natasha Newman, age 31 of Charlotte, 19th overall at 1:20:55; and Karen Wandel, age 43 of Cornelius, 26th overall at 1:25:16.

The event attracted a

Teachers build a close personal connection with each child in their care. The Preschool has been open to the public for three and four-year old students for over 35

years and is located in its own facilities within the Mt. Pisgah Lutheran Church property on Route 127 in Bethlehem (located in front of the Lowe's shopping center).

Opening parent's meeting for the Fall 2017 school year will be held in August, with the school year starting September 5th, 2017. "In order to keep our student to teacher ratios at optimum benefit to the individual student, we encourage early enrollment for our new students," states Mt. 
