MDNHA to provide grant workshops with statewide funders

The Mississippi Delta National Heritage Area will hold a series of workshops across the Delta to present information about grants available in 2017 to support local projects and activities that further MDNHA's mission of fostering preservation, perpetuation and celebration of the Delta's heritage through a climate of collaboration and sustainable economic develop-

This is the second year the MDNHA has offered the workshops in conjunction with its grant program. Last year, 14 grants were funded, totaling over \$185,000. Up to \$200,000 will be available from MDNHA for grants in 2017. Representatives from the MS Arts Commission, MS Humanities Council and MS Department of Archives and History will also be present at each workshop to discuss funding opportunities that may complement the work funded by MDNHA.
