Contraband seized at Holmes County jail

Two regional facilities were the subject of surprise shakedowns early Thursday, March 16, as part of the Mississippi Department of Corrections' contraband crackdown known as Operation Zero Tolerance.

Officers searched the Yazoo County Correctional Facility in Yazoo City and the Holmes-Humphreys County Regional Correctional Facility in Lexington before dawn, respectively, bringing to five the number of facilities Corrections Commissioner Pelicia Hall has ordered searched this month.

At the Yazoo facility, officers found homemade alcoholic beverage and excessive nuisance contraband.

Several cell phones, cell phone chargers, cell phone batteries, digital scales, cigarette lighters, packages of cigarettes, and suspected spice and marijuana were seized at the Holmes County facility. In addition, large amounts of commissary items were found with several inmates, indicating that the inmates may be using the items for illegal purposes, such as extortion.

On Thursday, March 9, after a four day trail, a Humphreys County Jury returned a verdict of guilty for Fred Hogan of Tchula in the 2015 slaying of victim Tahiti Banks of Belzoni, Mississippi.

Hogan was charged with One Count of First Degree Murder as a Habitual Offender and One Count of Possession of Firearm by a Convicted Felon.
