an ongoing problem that drains that to the 8,000 Mississippians necessary resources from our with disabilities and other serineediest citizens. Mississippi Medicaid currently has an \$89 million deficit fueled by enrollment increases (up by 1,412 to 779,298 in the last year alone) and rising medical costs. In short, more people are signing up and the cost to cover each recipient is increasing. While the vast majority of those on welfare are eligible to receive services, some are not. We estimate this number to be around 10 percent, based on the experience of other states. Given that the current social safety net is under financial pressure, it makes sense to look for savings by cutting fraud and removing ineligible recipients, some of whom either don't live in Mississippi or are using a false identity to collect benefits.

Even this modest reform, however, is being questioned by those who claim that if the price of catching 100 cases of fraud

Tell ous needs currently on a waiting list for Medicaid's Home and Community Based Services. Tell that to eligible Medicaid recipients who can't find a dentist or who have to wait months to see a doctor. As former U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder put it, "I don't think people necessarily thought that something as well intentioned as Medicare and Medicaid would necessarily attract fraudsters. But I think we have to understand that it certainly has.'

For this reason, a number of states have started to proactively audit their welfare rolls using verification procedures like those called for in HB 1090, a bill pending the Mississippi legislature. These states (of all political stripes, I might add) include: Alaska, Arkansas, Illinois, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, results in the removal of just and Wyoming. Critics of HB

fraud in these states does not mean we will find fraud in Mississippi. This is wishful thinking. If current fraud detection rates are low, it is because our agencies are not using all the tools available for identifying

Consider Massachusetts' experience in combating welfare fraud. In fiscal year 2015, they identified \$13.7 million in food stamp fraud, "a 44 percent increase over the previous year's record of \$9.5 million and the fifth straight year of recordsetting findings." The state's auditor attributed the increase in fraud detection to be the result of using better systems and technology, noting that "the increased findings of fraud do not

1090 contend that evidence of necessarily indicate more fraud in these programs, but is reflective of greater effectiveness by the agency in identifying fraudulent behavior."

> We all embrace technological innovation when it comes to medicine: for instance, new tests or procedures that make it easier to detect cancer or diabetes. We embrace technology that makes it easier to secure our homes, cars and businesses. Should not we do the same when it comes to securing the integrity of our welfare programs?

Eliminating welfare fraud is not a right or left issue. It is not a conservative or liberal issue. It is a commonsense issue. Whatever party you belong to, encourage your state lawmaker to vote for HB 1090.
