

# Durant monument slated at Liberty Park for slain Catholic sisters

The brutal slayings of two Catholic sisters who lived in Durant and worked in Lexington and beyond, are still felt through the local communities they served.

August 25 will mark one year since the two sisters were found stabbed in their home on Castalian Springs Road and the arrest of Rodney Earl Sanders.

A grassroots effort to memorialize the two servants of Christ is developing with the hopes of erecting a monument at Liberty Park in Durant.

Carolyn Riley, who is part of the efforts, said she is carrying on from a conversation she had a with another friend who is now deceased.

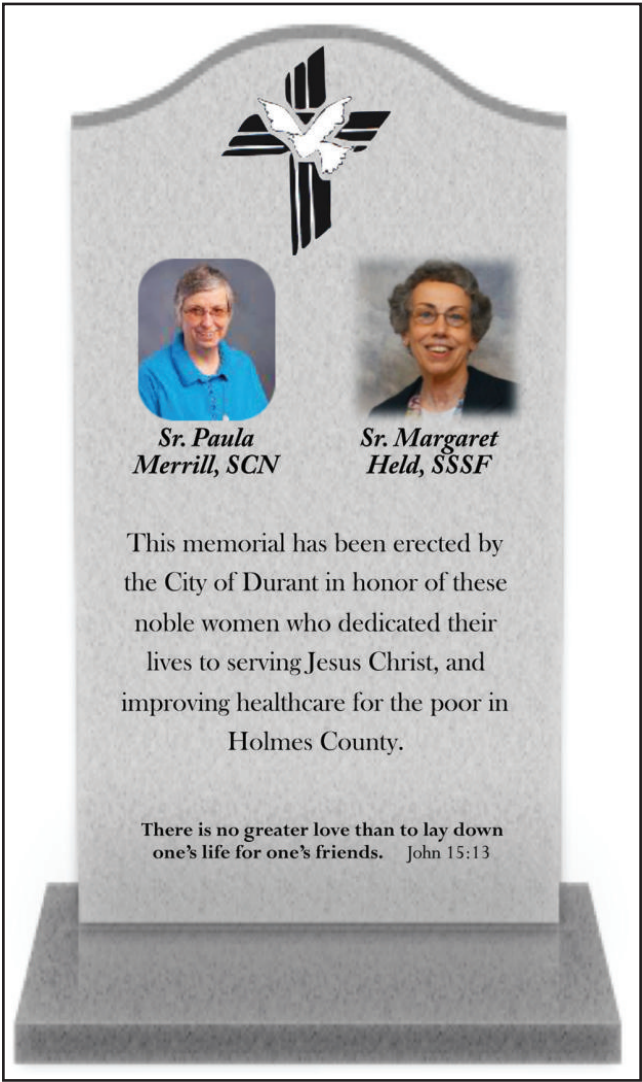
“After the incident that happened, you know Mrs. Jonell was talking and I was telling her that I didn’t realize that the nuns were so well loved in Holmes County,” said Riley. “A lot of people I saw at the scene (the day the two sisters were found murdered), they were so emotional about it, seeing how the people in Holmes County, especially in Durant, how much they loved the sisters because of their dedication. They were so dedicated to the community.”

Riley’s friend Jonell Payton passed away in November. Payton was serving as alderman for Durant in Ward 1 at the time, whom Riley replaced in a special election.

“I began to tell Mrs. Jonell,” said Riley, ““We don’t need to let this pass us up, for noble ladies like these. We don’t need to forget them, I think there should be something to remember and honor their work.”

“So we went to the (Durant Board of Aldermen) and the board OK’d that we could do this monument,” Riley continued, “put the monument in Liberty Park in their honor. We wanted to check with the diocese, the church, and make sure it was OK with them. I talked to Father Greg (Plata) in Lexington. He began to tell me he thought it was a great idea that they would be honored. We wanted him to get up with (the sisters’) families and see when they could be available for a memorial service and how they would want it. We wanted their input, because we didn’t want to do anything against their wishes or offend them.

“My plans were, and the City

of Durant’s, was to ask the different churches, businesses, to offer a donation so we can pay for this monument in honor of them,” Riley said. “Any of the money left over, I would love for it to go in to a scholarship in their honor also. I think, if I’m not mistaken, that there is one set up by the families, so if we have any funds left over it can go to them.”

Riley explained that donations would be accepted through the City of Durant through a separate fund.

“Like I was telling Father Greg, I really didn’t know how to go about doing this. I didn’t want to accept any money, me personally. I asked the mayor (Tasha Davis), she said it could be sent to the City of Durant and the city would be over it, in a separate account” with the left over funds put towards a scholarship.

The exact location within Lib-

erty Park has not been selected yet, according to Riley, but she thinks it would on the opposite side of the park gazebo from the current 9/11 Memorial.

“I hoping after next week we’ll have everything settled,” said Riley.

A memorial service is set for Saturday, May 20 at 3 p.m. in Liberty Park in Durant. The park is located at Northeast Depot Street and MS Highway 12.

A time of prayer and reflection will be held followed by a light reception.

Riley added that she also has future plans to erect a monument for deceased Durant ward two alderman Jonell Payton whose seat on the board she replaced. Payton died at a Jackson hospital in November 2016 after sustaining a head injury at the Holmes County Courthouse.
