Pickens man sentenced for assaulting sister-in-law

On Tuesday, October 10, Attorney General Jim Hood announced the sentencing of 29-year-old Phillip Bullock, who was charged with breaking into his sister-in-law's home to beat her up.

Bullock, of Pickens, pleaded guilty Monday in Holmes County Circuit Court to one count of aggravated assault and one count of burglary of a dwelling. Judge Jannie Lewis sentenced him to 10 years on each count, with seven to serve and three suspended on each count. The sentence runs concurrent with a broke into his sister-in-law's

Judge Lewis also ordered Bullock to pay \$1,600 in court costs and \$500 to the Mississippi Crime Victim Compensation Fund. He must also receive his GED, as well as mandatory mental evaluation and treatment.

"There is absolutely zero reason for this type of behavior, and I'm glad to see he will serve the time he deserves," said Hood. "I also thank Judge Lewis for recognizing the importance of requiring that this man get help so that others will not be in his path of violence."

Bullock was arrested and investigated by the Pickens Police Department and indicted by the Holmes County District Attorney, who eventually recused
