National softball tournament at Traceway Park, fireworks planned

"Residents are invited to attend the fireworks show and join the celebration," said Mark Jones, the City's pub-

lic information officer. "City officials do remind residents that the fireworks show will start around 7:45 to 8 p.m. Residents in the area who have outdoor pets are encouraged to make arrangements to move the animals inside during the fireworks show."

Games continue Thursday, May 18, at 1:30, 3:30 and 5:30 p.m. in the course of the double elimination tournament. Friday games will be played at noon, 2 p.m. and 4 p.m.

The championship round on Saturday features games at 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.; but, should a previously undefeated team suffer its first loss, the deciding game would be played at 3:30 p.m.

The teams will bring about 400 players and coaches to participate in the fast-paced seven-inning games. Spectators can enjoy the competition with a \$12 day pass or a complete tournament pass for \$35. Groups of ten or more receive a group discount at \$10 per ticket. Children under the age of twelve will be admitted free. Parking is also free.

The 2017 tournament is the final year of a three-year contract for Clinton's Parks and Rec Department to host the tournament; but, with the recent renewal by the NJCAA Events Committee, Clinton will welcome participants for another three years, through 2020.

In addition to bringing favorable exposure to the City of Clinton, the economic value

of the national tournament adds about \$300,000 to the City's sales tax collections, primarily from hotel room bookings, restaurant meals, and gas purchases the teams and their fans make during their week-long stay.

"The NJCAA is the only national cham-

pionship held in the state of Mississippi and is a major boost to our economy." said Clinton Mayor Phil Fisher. "Havjunior college athletic departments throughout the United States. Similar to the organization and governance of

Wyatt and Cross will broadcast to a statewide and southern regional radio audience live from the softball fourplex at Traceway Park from 3 p.m. until 6 p.m. on May 17. Locally, residents can listen to the show on Supertalk Mississippi 97.3 FM.

"We have geared this event from more than just a tournament to an all-out experience we hope players, coaches and spectators never forget," said Smith
