Click It or Ticket campaign starts May 22

As summer kicks off and families hit the road for vacations, the Clinton Police Department is reminding motorists to Click It or Ticket. Aimed at enforcing seat belt use to help keep drivers and families safe, the national seat belt campaign will take place May 22 through June 4, concurrent with one of the busiest travel and holiday weekends of the year.

"Our law enforcement personnel see firsthand the loss of life when people rething, and it should be an automatic next step after sitting down in a vehicle."

As the Memorial Day weekend approaches and the summer vacation season ramps up, "we want to keep our community members safe, and make sure people are doing the one thing that can save them in a crash: buckling up. If the enforcement crackdown wakes people up to the dangers of unrestrained driving and gets them to buckle up, we'll consider it a success," said Hayman.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, nearly half of the 22,441 passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes in 2015 were unrestrained. At night from 6 p.m. to 5:59 a.m., that number soared to 57 percent of those killed. That's why one focus of the Click It or Ticket campaign is nighttime enforcement. Participating law enforcement agencies will be taking a no-excuses approach to seat belt law enforcement, writing citations day and night.

CPSD to conduct 2017 summer school session

Four schools in the Clinton Public School District will hold summer school from June 5 through July 14.

Clinton High School, Sumner Hill Junior High, Clinton Junior High and Lovett Elementary all received approval from the school board to conduct summer sessions

CHS will offer all courses for credit re-

covery to students in grades ten through twelve. Driver's education and health will be offered to first-time students only.

Tuition for full-credit courses is \$300 for students in the district and \$350 for students outside of district. Tuition for half-credit courses is \$150 for students in the district and \$175 for students outside of district. Sumner Hill will offer remediation courses at the same rate as CHS. Courses for seventh- and eighth-grade students will cost \$150 each. Students may enroll in a maximum of two courses. All students will report to CHS.

"Summer school classes for junior high students would be held at Clinton High School," said Dr. Bill Hardin, CJHS principal. "All classes offered in summer school would be through an online resource for accredited courses."



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
