Main Street Clinton – Ten Years and Counting

In that time, Main Street Clinton has won twenty-one Mississippi Main Street Awards, established sixty reoccurring events, and assisted in locating over thirty businesses in the Main Street districts. When reflecting on the last ten years, it's not hard to identify why Main Street Clinton has been effective in its mission to revitalize Olde Towne and the Boulevard Business District. The generosity of local businesses who have invested in the program, great community partners who recognize the role that revitalization plays in the overall health and viability of our community, wonderful volunteer leadership on our Board of Directors and committees... Red Brick Roads

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For the second year in a row, Main Street Clinton has partnered with the Chamber of Commerce to bring Red Brick Roads-a two-day, two-stage music and arts festival-to Clinton. The outdoor concert took place on the historic brick streets of Olde Towne Clinton, the heart of the Clinton community, and

featured local singer-songwriters and regional bands, as well as filmmakers, visual and interactive artists, and more. Red Brick Roads highlighted local talent in a songwriters' round robin on Friday night, including three Mississippi acts: Cody Cox, Patrick McClary, and Schaefer Llana, as well as Alabama native Mackenzie Lockhart. Elliot Root was the headliner for the evening. The festival held a film screening on Friday night, highlighting Mississippi filmmakers and stories about the people in our state. Day two of Red Brick Roads featured a full day of live music, with three Mississippi bands including Young Valley, Greater Pyrenees, and the Southern Komfort Brass Band. Stoop Kids and Knox Hamilton also performed, with Colony House as the headliner for the evening. In addition to live music, Red Brick Roads featured an artist showcase, Mississippi food trucks and sweet treats, and craft beer. Renowned watercolorist Wyatt Waters painted onsite, as did caricaturist David Jackson, and interactive public art displays were featured throughout the festival. Over twenty local and regional beers were on tap, along with two exclusive festival brews. Red Brick Roads further establishes Olde Towne as the arts district for our community, celebrating local talent and creatives on the charming brick streets.
