# **KPANDS OB-GYN HOURS**

Haley Gleason and her colleagues at St. Rose Health Center realize families face scheduling difficulties when trying to juggle OB-GYN appointments so that family members can attend too.

Therefore, Gleason and two other specialists will

have expanded Thursday hours to accommodate fathers and other loved ones.

Beginning July 20, Gleason will see obstetrics and gynecology patients from noon to 7 p.m.

"Not only does this include the traditional lunch hour but the time

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between 4 and 7 p.m. will be especially attractive to families," said Gleason, advanced practice registered nurse. "We hope this promotes more family involvement."

Services include low-risk OB follow-ups; OB-GYN post-operative exams; fetal heart monitoring; and ultrasounds, including Hello Baby 4D procedures. Gleason also will offer pelvic exams and PAPs during the expanded hours.

Each of these physicians sees patients weekly at the HaysMed Specialty Clinic at St. Rose.



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## **DID YOU KNOW?**

According to the American Cancer Society, melanoma skin cancer is less common than other types of skin cancer, though it is more likely to grow and spread. Melanoma begins in skin cells known as melanocytes. Melanocytes make melanin, a pigment that gives skin its tan or brown color and protects the skin from some of the harmful effects of the sun. The ACS notes that most melanoma cells still make melanin, and when that occurs the melanoma tumors are typically brown or black. When melanomas do not make melanin, the tumors may appear pink, tan or white. Melanomas can develop anywhere on the skin, but they are more likely to develop in certain areas depending on a person's gender. For men, melanomas are most likely to develop on the chest or trunk, while women who develop melanomas are most likely to get them on their legs.







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
