August is National Immunization Awareness Month. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends routine vaccination to prevent 17 vaccine-preventable diseases that can occur in infants, children, adolescents, or adults. While some individuals choose not to vaccinate, it is important to understand that immunization can be a crucial step in preventing and even eliminat-

ing deadly diseases.

WHY DO WE VACCINATE?

Thanks to the prevalence of vaccines, some diseases (such as polio and diphtheria) are now incredibly rare in the United States. This is partly because we have been diligent about immunizing against them. But the low incidence of these diseases does not mean the vaccines are no longer necessary;

unless we can eliminate the disease completely, immunizations are essential to prevent a disease from making a comeback. For example, in the mid 1970's in Japan rumors began to spread that a certain vaccine was not safe. The immunization rate of children dropped from 80% to 10% over a period of two years and resulted in a major endemic of the disease with 41 deaths.

work includes careful study and evaluation by highly-trained scientists and doctors. These studies identify common side effects of each vaccine and continue to monitor for side effects even after a vaccine is approved. Adverse side effects from immunization are possible. However public health officials take great care

in weighing the benefits of a vaccine against its risks before recommending vaccines. Information about risks and potential side effects are provided to patients/parents before every vaccine.

WHEN DO WE VACCINATE?

The suggested timing for each recommended

vaccines is based on the youngest age at which individuals are usually at risk, as well as the age at which the administration of the vaccine has been shown to be both effective and safe. Recommended practices are regularly reviewed, so talk to you doctor if you have questions about vaccinations for yourself or your children.
