Great Bend football team must overcome big losses at skill positions

Erin Beck walked into a loaded football team last fall. A first-year head coach in Great Bend, Beck led the Panthers to a 10-2 record that included a run all the way to the state semifinals. This season, Beck must fill some big shoes after losing several of his top skill players to graduation.

"That year one, everything is just a whirlwind," Beck said. "It's good to be in here around these coaches and kids for a full year. I feel way more prepared. I'm very excited about the 2017 Panthers.

"We still have a lot of question marks but we're going to lean heavily on our defense. We have six returners back from a defense that got better as the year went. We will rely heavily on them early as we see who is going to step up in those skill positions."

Three of Great Bend's top players from a year ago have moved on to Fort Hays State University. Topping that listquarterback Jacob Murray, who threw for 2,281 yards and 23 touchdowns, and rushed for another 1,322 yards and 26 scores a year ago. He also helped quarterback the West team to a win at the Kansas Shrine Bowl.

Junior Koy Brack steps into fill those shoes. Brack saw limited time under center last year with 118 yards on 3-of-4 passing. Brack was a bigger threat at wideout with 471 yards and three touchdowns on 42 receptions.

"They're definitely some big shoes to fill," Brack said. "I'm just trying to do the best I can to help my team. It should be a really good year."

Wideout Bryce Lytle paced the Panthers with 1,035 yards on 75 receptions. He has also moved on to FHSU. Braden Smith caught 33 passes for 692 yards last season. Beck will be without his top-three receivers from a year ago.

"We have our starting wide receiver sliding into our quarterback position," said Beck. "Other than that, we're pretty young. We have a couple sophomores who will play at running back, and some seniors who will be really good wide receivers but just don't have varsity experience. Dalton Bieker and Ty Esfeld will be looked to for leadership."

Missing out of the backfield, Cal Marshall was another 1,000-yard rusher, coming in at just




nents 6-2, then edged Pratt 6-4. She beat Ashland 6-4 in her final set of the day.
