Macksville XC building up for 2017

BY MIKE GILMORE In the last few seasons, the Macksville "Running Mustangs" cross country seasons have rolled with the changes, but at least one thing remains the same.

Getting to the state meet at Wamego will be tough.

"Not only is 2A cross country one of the toughest classifications, but we will also have to score the first five runners now for a team score," noted Macksville cross country coach Mike Hullman. "We have high expectations going into the season, as always, but we know that we will need each and every runner this season since we do not have as big of a team as in the past."

The Mustang boys will be facing some stiff competition in local meets this season, from teams like Kiowa County and St. John. As it usually does, however, some running room has opened up in front of the pack, as Frank Cuevas won his last 2A individual title in October. The St. John boys have come on strong of late, winning the team title by edging Stanton County.

On the girls' side, Stanton County's Rebecca Avelar set a course record at regionals and then won state last year as a senior. Kiowa County's girls won regionals at Meade, but Bennington put three in the top 10 to edge out the Lady Mavs at state.

Last season, senior Emma Stimatze, who is running this year at Johnson County, was the Lady Mustangs' solo runner at Wamego and the boys finished fourth at regionals.

"Our runners are very competitive, but we are really going to challenge them this season to accomplish our goals every

- The Lady 'Stangs will have challenges out of the gate. Junior Itzel Garcia (22:32 PR) will be taking on a leadership role as a returning top-four runner on the team. "She has learned from our past leading runners and is now ready for her turn," Hullman said.

Senior Serena Blaske will be running her first season and junior Christine Garza (27:50 PR) is a one-year letterwinner. "Serena is looking forward to the challenge and has been doing some running this summer. Christine is back for another season and we have challenged her because she has the ability to be a good runner for us."

The balance of the squad is sophomores. Kiley Blevins (27:02 PR); Caren Holguin (27:45 PR); Kaylee Hottovy (26:58 PR); Elena Kuckelman (28:55 PR) and Lydia Mendez (24:45) each lettered last year as freshmen. "These sophomores had to step up already last season to help us with our team scores," Hullman noted. "They earned a lot of great experience with most running on the regional team that will help them along the way."

Anna Suiter is a fresh-

man who ran distance last year as an eighth-grader.

Boys' team outlook – The Macksville boys' squad was hit hard by graduation, losing its top three runners. Four of the top seven return in 2017. Senior Brandon Ibarra (19:30 PR) is in the top six and senior Wilhelm Penner (23:38) came on late last season.

Three juniors, Trey Britton (22:25 PR); Andrew Cross (19:40 PR); Jacob Suiter (21:04) are returning two-year letterwinners. "This is the group that we will be counting on heavily this season," Hullman said. " Trey started the season with some great times; Andrew is one of those runners that just needs a little more confidence on the course. We will need to keep Jacob healthy this season since he has been through some past injuries."

Harley Blaske (21:12 PR) and Gabe Wolff (20:15) are sophomores. "Harley was challenging for a top spot last year and Gabe really helped us out at the end moving up to the regional team."

Clevin Huggins is the lone freshman in his first season of cross country. The Mustangs open

the season Saturday, Sept. 2, in Hoisington.
