Casey interviewed Daniel Ward and Trent talked with Don Gerkin. Casey stated, "When I met with United States Marine Corps Veteran Daniel Ward, he gave me some interesting advice. He told me: 'Be willing to fail.' He said that joining the military was not easy and he told me that in order to be successful, I would have to 'push myself and make myself uncomfortable.' In other words, I think he was telling me to face my challenges head on." Mr. Ward joined the United States Marine Corps in 1993 and served until 1997. The crowd enjoyed his report and congratulates Daniel Ward for his

service. Trent had the privilege to interview Vietnam War Veteran Don Gerkin, He served in the United States Marine Corps for three years, from 1969 to 1972. He was stationed at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii with the Fleet Marine Force. Veteran Gerkin told Trent one of the most memorable experiences he recalls from his time in the Marines was when he got to stand on the turret of the USS Arizona that was sunk on December 7, 1941 at Pearl Harbor and play echo taps to another Marine who was on Ford Island during the ceremony when Japanese and American Veterans met for the first time. He also was present when the astronauts returned from Apollo 14 and 15 space missions. Mr. Gerkin's advice for the younger generations is "You should always respect your country

Kohlbecker, of Tuscola, talked about his work with veterans through the Department of Veterans Affairs at various VA facilities. He talked mostly about counseling those suffering from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder commonly referred to by the acronym PTSD.

He shared several anecdotes about interacting with veterans over the years which were humorous, touching and gut wrenching. He explained that everyone who serves either in combat or non-combat roles will leave the military with some level of impact on their lives.

He also addressed the non-veterans in attendance about how to speak to a veteran about their service and that the best way to do that was be a good listener. He explained that different veterans will be willing to share their stories, if at all, in different ways and at different times. He advised let them make that determination on when, how and if that will come about.
