
### WHITE COUNTY WARRIORETTES DEKALB COUNTY LADY TIGERS

### Former Eagle to speak at gala

Jon Dorenbos, former long snapper for the Philadelphia Eagles and performing magician, is the keynote speaker for the 11th annual Saint Thomas Rutherford Society Gala on Jan. 20.
