

Hundreds lined the streets Friday afternoon for the Tiger Pride homecoming parade, the parade spanning nearly a mile long from front to back, filled with floats and decorated vehicles.

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The senior class got bragging rights for best float as its Tigers Tank the Wildcats entry got the top grade from the judges. The float depicted an aquarium complete with a bubble machine and Tiger mascot. The sophomore float took second and the basketball team third in the overall float competition.
