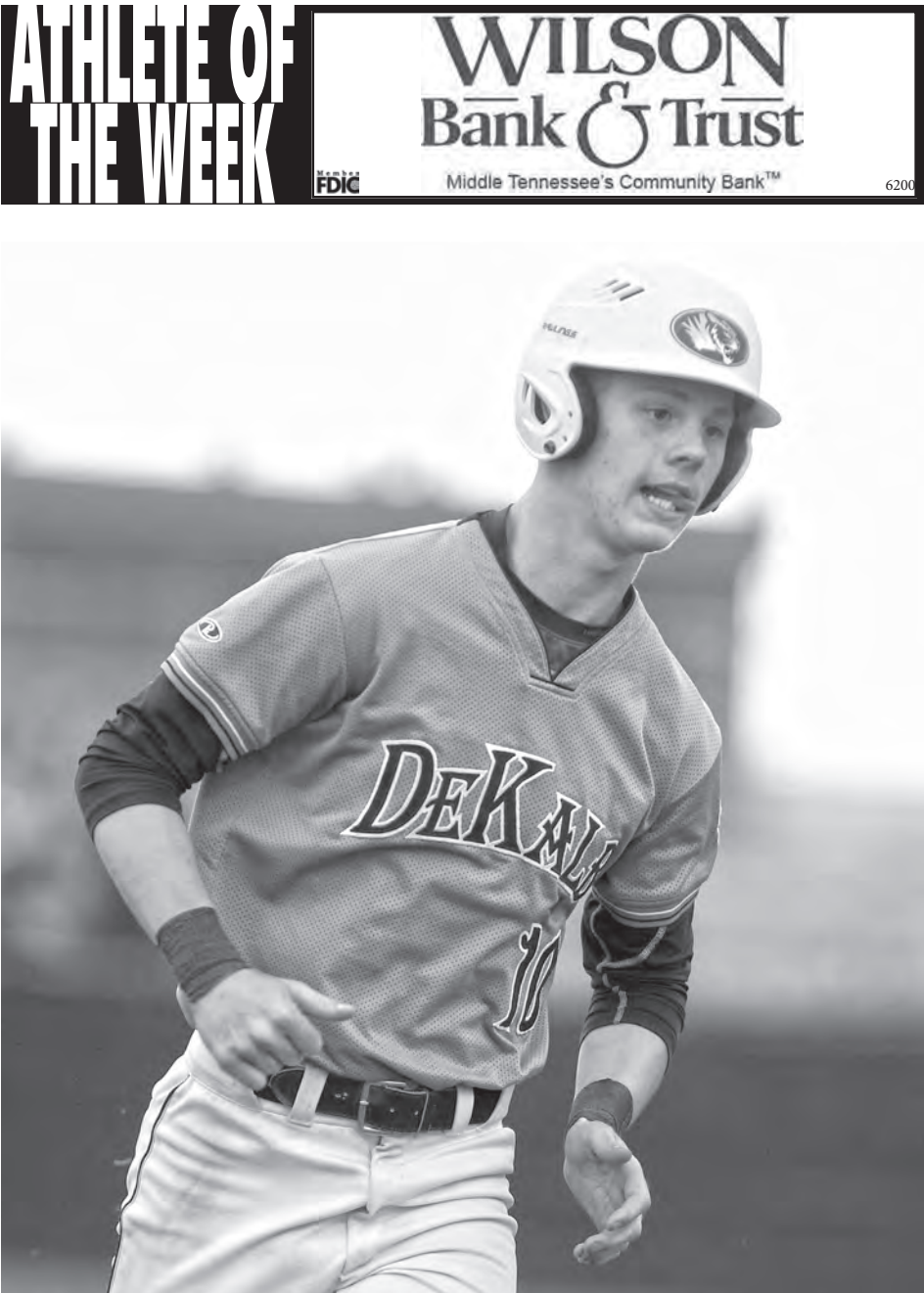


Reception planned for Martin
