In the third district, incumbent Jack Barton was beaten by Jenny Trapp and Bobby Johnson. Trapp had had 254, Johnsen 2111, and Barton 186. They will move on to face Republican Renee Steff in August with the top two to win office.

In the fourth district, incumbents Jonathan Norris and Wayne Cantrell were beaten by Dr. Scott Little

and Janice Fish-Stewart. They will take on Republican Greg Matthews in August with the top two winning office. The vote ended up being 193 for Fish, 192 for Little, 167 for Norris, 163 for Cantrell and 66 for Taylor

In the fifth district, incumbent Anita Puckett and Lloyd Emmons moved on without opposition to face Republican Jerry Adcock and Independent William Rutherford in August with the top two winning office.

In the sixth district, incumbents Betty Atnip and Jeff Barnes won without opposition. They will face Republican Matt Adcock in August with the top two winning office.

In the seventh district, incumbent Kevin Robinson was eliminated. Larry Summers got 135 votes and Beth Pafford got 173. They will move on to August to face Republican Bruce Malone with the top two winning office.
