School board sets new school as top priority

The incoming school board, which includes one new member, stood united at the county's swearing in ceremonies, declaring their top priority in the coming term is

to build a new school or schools.

"New schools," answered board member Shaun Tubbs when asked his top priority for the coming term, his answer echoed by fellow members Jim Beshearse, Kate Miller, Danny Parkerson and incoming school board member Alan Hayes.

The goal has remained consistent since the board of education

began an information-gathering initiative to help decide what course the county should take in its school building program. The board members, and many of the former county commission, agreed that a school building program is sorely needed as schools like Smithville Elementary are way past their prime.

During an informal workshop recently, Director of Schools Patrick Cripps and the board focused on two options, those being building a new pre-k to fifth-grade elementary school and adding on to Northside Elementary to make it a pre-K to fifth-grade school or building two new pre-k to eighthgrade elementary schools and adding on to Northside Elementary to make it a pre-K to eighth-grade school.

Cripps requested each board member give him a written list pros and cons of each option for review at a later meeting. In the end the board could settle on either option, submit both plans, or suggest another alternative for the new county commission to consider. The commission will have 10 new members when it next meets.

Upland Design Group has presented six options for consideration with that number realistically narrowed down to three. The building costs has been figured around \$30 million.
