ATTENTION DISABLED AND ELDERLY VOTERS November 6, 2018

The State and Federal General Election will be held November 6, 2018 in all precincts in DeKalb County for the purpose of electing a Governor, U.S. Senator, Congressman in U.S. Congressional District 6, Tennessee Senator in Senate District 17, and Tennessee Representative in State House Districts 40 and 46.

In accordance with T.C.A. 2-3-109(e)(1) & (2)(A) public notice is given that a voter with a disability or elderly voter whose precinct is inaccessible has the right to vote on Election Day, November 6, 2018, at the Election Commission Office, located in Room 104 of the DeKalb County Courthouse, 1 Public Square, Smithville, TN 37166.

In order to vote at the Election Commission Office on Election Day, a statement of intent must be filed at the County Election Office not less than 10 days prior to the first election in which the elderly voter or voter with a disability plans to vote at the Election Commission Office on Election Day. The deadline to file this statement of intent to vote at the Election Office is October 27, 2018.

Double work gets double pay

The head of Smithville's golf course and recreation center just got his pay doubled after the city board of mayor and aldermen found out his former partner had quietly left the job, leaving Ken Lacy to do the job of two.

Lacy will now be getting paid \$2,000 a month instead of \$1,000 to oversee the city's golf course, swimming pool and tennis courts. The move comes after the board learned co-manager Pete Ferguson had verbally resigned as of July, leaving Lacy with the whole job by himself.

The departure raised questions amongst the city board when they learned Ferguson did not work during July but got paid for it anyway. Board members grilled city

administrator Hunter Hendrixson on the chain of events of Ferguson's departure.

"In July and his insurance terminated at the end of July," Hen-

drixson recalled. "He was paid in July because we really weren't for sure. He didn't officially turn in his resignation until about the middle of July. He hadn't been there probably for several weeks."

Given the overlap, board members opened questioned if the city had any solution for discrepancy.

"If it was taken under false pretenses do we not have recourse?" wondered Alderman Shawn Jacobs.

"Are you saying we paid somebody for work that wasn't done?" inquired Alderman Danny Washer

While questions prevailed, there was no action taken by the board of mayor and aldermen concerning the Ferguson issue. The board voted unanimously to double Lacy's pay while noting they may be soon creating a parks director position so the city can apply for parks grants.

Under city charter, the seat must be filled and traditionally the outgoing alderman can suggest a replacement, although that suggestion must be ratified by the aldermanic council before anyone can officially take the seat.

"Let me say that I have had some very good interest," the mayor revealed. "I think a number of the people that has contacted me would do a fantastic job. But one name kept coming to my mind and I made a phone call. Let me say I contacted this person (Crook). He did not contact me. I feel like he would be a great asset to this board. I don't feel like he would be easily swayed and I feel like he would do what is best for our city. That is what I wanted in filling my (alderman) seat. I think that is what we all want. My recommendation to this board is that we appoint Mr. Donnie Crook to this council," said Mayor Miller.

The aldermanic council agreed with Miller's suggestion and unanimously

voted him onto the council.

Brandon Cox, who voted in his first meeting as alderman, admitted he had already been approached about candidates for the seat. He voted for Crook but pointed out the appointment is just for the remainder of Miller's un-

expired term which will be up in two years.

"I have had similar contacts," Cox told the mayor. "Making an appointment to an elected position is not a tenable position to be in. It's the most undemocratic way to do it but it's what we have to do according to the charter.

There have been numerous people that I think are well qualified that could take this seat and I hope they do run in two years for the vacancy."

Crook has owned Stop N' Buy Market in Liberty for the past 12 years and has lived in Smithville for nearly 50 years.
