Heading down the stretch

It's time for the WCHS basketball teams to build some down-the-stretch momentum as they put the finishing touches on the regular season and prepare for tournament competition.

Heading into Tuesday night's home game against White County, it's been a sparkling 16-4 season for the Pioneers. The Lady Pioneers are 11-10 and have shown flashes of promise, including a district win Saturday night in Cookeville.

So what can we expect from these teams as February, and the postseason, approaches?

It's been a different kind of year for the Pioneers with the most noticeable difference being the team's eye-catching record. To win 80 percent of your games is a great accomplishment.

I like Warren County's overall athleticism and think the Pioneers can compete with Cookeville for the district title. I don't know if Saturday's loss in Cookeville is a fair indication of Warren County's capabilities.

I'm probably not the only one to have noticed this, but the Pioneers didn't get to practice all week because of snow, then they had to face the Cavs in Cookeville. That's not a blueprint for success.

On the girls side, the Lady Pioneers have beaten some decent teams this year. That includes a sweep of Tullahoma and a huge home win against Coffee County.

The problem, as you might expect, is beating teams with elite players. Upperman serves as a prime example.

There are some talent-packed teams in District 6-AAA, including Stone Memorial and Rhea County. It will be a challenge for the Lady Pioneers to beat either one of those teams, mainly due to their lack of baseline-to-baseline foot speed.

For the Pioneers to win the district tournament, it's going to take lights-out perimeter shooting from players like Chance Hobbs, Isaiah Grayson and Irving Espinoza.

For the Lady Pioneers, it's going to take monster play from Tyra Wright in the paint, combined with brilliant shooting from 3-point specialist Megan Patch.

Frantic finishes were the calling card of elementary action at J.K. Stanley Gymnasium Monday night. In both games, the home squad was able to protect home court in the final minutes.

The Lady Broncos erased a five-point deficit in the final quarter to top Dibrell 20-15, while two late free throws from Nathan Turner helped the Boyd boys beat the Wildcats 33-31.

The Boyd girls entered the fourth quarter trailing 13-8. Needing a boost, coach Allison Stiles decided to turn up the heat on Dibrell.

"We went to man-to-man fullcourt pressure," said Stiles. "We got a few steals and baskets as a result. It was an exciting game and we're grateful to get the win."

Bella Stiles and Ava Jones

were at the forefront of the press and were able to get two layups apiece. Jones finished with a team-high 10 points, followed by Stiles with 8 and Lia Bedwell with 2.

Lily Rains led Dibrell with 7 points, while Abby Sullivan scored 4 and Sophie Woodlee and Emily Davis finished with 2 points each.

It was fitting Turner was at the line to give the Broncos a chance at victory. Turner calmly sank the late go-ahead free throws, part of an 18-point night. Kaden Mowl added 8 points as Boyd beat Dibrell for the third time this season. Thomas Burks chipped in 3, while Keyton Reno and Jordan Perry each had 2 points.

Garrison Randolph nearly shot Dibrell to victory. Randolph scored 20 points, including four second-half 3-pointers. Matthew Arnold added 8, while Zack Mullican scored 3.

The Pioneers and Lady Pioneers each collected wins in the opening round of the Central Tennessee Conference tournament held in Coffee County.

Bella Cantrell's big 3-pointer in overtime helped the Lady Pioneers defeat White County 27-24, while the emergence of Kaden Rutledge continued in the Pioneers' 38-31 victory over Shelbyville Harris.

The Lady Pioneers, who began the season 1-10, have turned the corner just in time. Winners of three of its last five games, Warren County continued its upward trend with a nail-biter against the Lady

Warriors.

Katie Toney hit key fourth-quarter free throw for the Lady Pioneers to help push the game into extra time. In OT, Cantrell hit the shot of the game when she buried the eventual game-winning 3-pointer.

It was part of a 7-point performance for Cantrell, while Toney paced the Lady Pioneers with 8 points. Marli McBride added 6, while Halo Armstrong chipped in 4 and Savannah Winfree scored 2.

Rutledge, a seventh grader, provided a huge boost for the boys by scoring a team-high 11 points. He was followed by Eli Kuykendall with 10, Caden Beaty with 6, Keldric Cox with 4, Chance Hunter with 3 and Hudson O'Connor and Asher Wallace with two points apiece.
