Forth, 22, released after drunken target practice

A man who got drunk and began popping off rounds with his pistol in his backyard off East Main Street has been released on time-served.

The man, William S. Forth, 22, entered guilty pleas before General Sessions Judge Bill Locke on charges of possession of a handgun while under the influence. He was given an 11-month, 29-day probationary sentence and

must pay \$50 plus costs and was directed to forfeit his handgun.

Police were dispatched to East Main Street after someone called 911 to say they heard gunshots in the vicinity. When policeman Toby Lewis arrived to investigate the call he found Forth.

"He was in the backyard, passed out on a bench," Lewis revealed. "Located near the bench was an almost empty bottle of Wild Turkey.

Lewis said he literally found the smoking gun while investigating. "There was an odor of alcohol coming from the male's person," he reported. "And, he had a 45-caliber handgun between his feet with spent shell casings nearby.

After being rousted, Forth told the officer he had been shooting at cans in his backyard which was in close proximity of his neighbor's house on East Main Street. The officer noted Forth had live ammunition for the handgun in his pocket.

Their overabundance leaves shelter employees and volunteers struggling to care for them, as well as adult animals.

"I know I've said this before and I'll probably keep saying it, but if people would spay and neuter their animals, we wouldn't have this problem," said Pettrey. "The solution is to spay and neuter."

The information was presented during a Health and Welfare Committee meeting to receive a monthly Animal Control report.

During the month of January, the facility received 70 dogs, returned two to owners, adopted out four, and sent 61 to rescue. It also received 52 cats, adopted out three, had four grant-funded adoptions, and sent 87 to rescue. Along with having 22 puppies in its end-of-themonth total, it had 17 dogs and 27 cats.

If you want to adopt an animal, Warren County Animal Control and Adoption Center can be reached at 507-3647 and is located at 169 Paws Trail. Puppy adoption fee is \$97, which includes the cost of spay or neuter and rabies vaccination.
