Eagles upset in region tourney

With their sights set on a fourth straight state tournament, the Van Buren County Eagles saw their season end Saturday in the region tournament.


The Eagles were topped 84-76 by Clay County in the opening round of the Region 3A tournament. It snapped a three-year streak where Van Buren County claimed the region championship.

The loss came as a shock around the state. Van Buren County was ranked No. 2 in the state in Class A coming into the matchup and was expected to compete for a state title behind the leadership of Tennessee Tech signee Caden Mills. The Eagles had swept the season series against Clay County, winning 80-67 and 80-64 in previous meetings.

Clay County went on to win in the region semifinals Tuesday, beating Pickett County 76-61.

In girls basketball action, the Eaglettes were downed 57-26 by state-ranked Clarkrange.

Mallory Christian led Van Buren County (12-19) with 15 points in the loss. Rounding out the scoring was Kinzie Johnson with four, Emma Scoggins and Mika Davis with three and Gabby Young with one.

Vols vying for SEC title

STARKVILLE, MISS. (AP)

Tennessee stayed in the hunt for a Southeastern Conference title thanks to a stellar second-half performance on the road.

Admiral Schofield had 24 points, Lamonte Turner 12 and the added Volunteers 16th-ranked pulled away for a 76-54 victory over Mississippi State on Tuesday night.

Schofield also had seven rebounds and shot 9 of 18 from the field for the Volunteers (22-7, 12-5 SEC), who made 13 of their final

15 field goal attempts. Tennessee started the second half on a 16-8 run to grab complete control and led 56-42 with just under 14 minutes left in regulation. Mississippi State never got within 14 points the rest of the way.

Tennessee shot 56.3 percent from the field for the game. Mississippi State shot 39.2 percent for the game, including just 28.6 percent in the second half. Tennessee was 18 of 23 at the free throw line and out-rebounded the Bulldogs 34-24.

BIG PICTURE VOLS: The Volunteers kept their SEC regular-season title hopes alive and have won 10 of their last 12 games. Tennessee continues to use depth to its advantage - the Volunteers' reserves scored 25 points compared to six for Mississippi State.

MSU: The Bulldogs will likely have to make noise in the SEC Tournament along with getting a win at LSU Saturday to stay in the conversation.
