Lebanon officer killed when truck runs into creek

A Lebanon police officer returning home to DeKalb County after working the night shift lost his life Thursday morning when his truck ran off Highway 70 and into rain-swollen Dry Creek near Dowelltown.

The body of the officer, Joseph Bowen, 28, was recovered several hundred feet downstream from where his Chevy Silverado came to rest on its side in the middle of the fast-moving torrent, one side of the truck barely visible above the surface. Investigators believe Bowen ran off the road, just missing a guardrail that would have kept him from running into the creek, and then struck a tree before plummeting over an embankment

and into the swift water. The truck was found after a search was instigated for Bowen when he did not return home as expected. Searchers learned his cellphone was last pinged around 7:29 a.m. on Highway 70 near Goose Creek

A Highway Patrol helicopter aided the search and the truck was spotted in the river just after noon. A small army of searchers

were involved in the hunt for the missing officer.

The loss is an especially hard one in DeKalb County as prior to taking a job in Lebanon, Bowen had worked for the DeKalb County Sheriff's Department.

"Joe Bowen and his family have been true servants to this county. Joe's wife, Kim, is a 911 dispatcher for DeKalb County," said DeKalb County Sheriff Patrick Ray. "His father, Dewayne, was a former deputy in DeKalb County before leaving to go to the Lebanon Police Department. Joe has served as a volunteer fireman for DeKalb

Ray continued, "He started his career in law enforcement working for my department as a correc-

tional officer. I then promoted him to a deputy position where he worked in that capacity until he left my department to go to the Lebanon Police Department. Joe was much more than an employee to me. He was a true friend. His personal life and work ethics were a true example of what every officer should be like."

Wirgau gets 180 days for sneak-attack robbery

A hired hand who hit his employer in the back of the head and stole his wallet before running from police on foot has been sentenced to 180 days in jail.

Adam Mark Wirgau, 28, was given 180 days to serve of a four-year sentence for robbery and evading arrest on foot. He was also ordered to pay restitution to John Douglass, the victim in the case, and was ordered to have no further contact with

Wirgau employed Douglass to help clean up property around his West Main Street home which burned in August 2017. The house, which was unoccupied at the time, was located

beside Hardee's and has since been leveled and removed.

"The young man had helped me for less than eight hours," said Douglass in an interview with the Standard. "I turned my back on him and was going

WCPI working to repair reception

Having trouble getting good reception from local public radio 91.3

The problem is probably not your radio. Weather damage to the station's transmitting antenna is most likely the culprit.

"We've had a lot of including damage, extreme winds and heavy rains, to our broadcasting tower," said Dr. Norman Rone, president of the nonprofit foundation that owns and operates WCPI 91.3. "Richard Myers, one of our great WCPI volunteers and also the station engineer, is working to repair the damage, but rain over the past few days has slowed that process. The antenna is 180 feet above ground on our tower southeast of downtown McMinnville. Because of personal safety concerns, Richard's crew has been prevented from climbing the tower until we have

better weather." The repairs are expected to be completed by the middle of this week, restoring the community-based, commercial-free radio station to

full power, Rone said. According to Myers, the radio power output, normally an effective 1,600 watts, has been cut by 80 percent.

"The signal has been good and reliable inside the city limits, but beyond that our listeners have had some disappointment," Myers said.

Under normal conditions, WCPI covers all of Warren County and much of the surrounding
