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But wait ... we now have the option of Tennessee Rideshare, a new taxi service operated by Sean Graham. Sean is available to take you around town, or on trips outside Warren County to faraway places like Nashville, Cookeville and Murfreesboro.

"I started this because I know it's a service that's needed," said Sean. "I worked at Yorozu for over four years and I know there are a lot of people who need a ride. I've been doing this about a month and so far it's been pretty decent. I've had some slow days and I've had some days where I'm running all over the place and could use another driver."

Sean said he did his homework before opening the taxi service. He said he did research on other taxi companies that once operated in Warren County to determine why they failed. He said it came down to the fact the rates were too high.

"You can't charge a bigcity price in a smaller market like this," said Sean. "People don't have the money to pay for it."

Seans says his rates are affordable. He charges a \$3 base rate then \$1 for every mile after that. There is no charge per minute, as some services assess, and there are no other hidden fees.

Sean says his taxi passengers are treated to free wi-fi that works off the hotspot in his phone. They are also given complimentary bottled water. He drives a Honda Pilot, which is comfortable and roomy enough to fit six passengers.

Interestingly enough, Sean used to work as a full-time dog trainer when he lived in Houston, Texas. He had enough business to earn a comfortable living.

"Then 2008 hit," said Sean. "I went from a full schedule to one customer a week."

Tennessee Rideshare is open seven days a week. It's available Sunday thru Thursday from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m., and Friday and Saturday from 6 a.m. to midnight.

"I was open 24 hours a day, but I wasn't getting enough rest," said Sean.

STATEWIDE BUSINESS ON RISE

Tennessee's economic health appears to be in good shape and doesn't need blood pressure medication just yet. According to figures released last week by the state, the number of new businesses continues to soar.

In the fourth quarter of 2017, the state reports there were 8,915 business filings, according to Secretary of State Tre Hargett. That's an 8.5 percent increase from the fourth quarter of 2016.

Hargett says initial business filings have now had positive year-overyear growth for 25 consecutive quarters.

"These numbers show that business leaders conto invest in Tennessee," said Hargett. "The Tennessee General Assembly and Gov. Haslam have created a welcoming business climate that will serve us well in the years ahead."

The state's unemployment remained historically low at 3.3 percent in December. Tennessee's unemployment remains well below the current national average of 4.1 percent.

State revenues for the current fiscal year are up 3.8 percent. The national economy is also experiencing solid growth with new jobs and housing starts, Hargett said.

Trump's proposed tariffs prompt strong reactions

BEIJING (AP) — China Trade Organization and has warned that U.S. President Donald Trump's vow to impose high tariffs on steel and aluminum would have a "huge impact" on the global trading order and said Beijing would work with other nations to protect its interests.

A Commerce Ministry official said late Friday that Trump's plan to levy tariffs of 25 percent on steel and 10 percent on aluminum would "seriously damage multilateral trade mechanisms represented by the World will surely have huge impact on normal international trade order."

"If the final measures of the United States hurt Chinese interests, China will work with other affected countries in taking measures to safeguard its own rights and interests," Wang Hejun, head of the ministry's trade remedy and investigation bureau, said in a statement on the ministry's website.

Chinese leaders have threatened in the past to retaliate if Trump raises

trade barriers, but now need to weigh whether to back up those threats with action and risk jeopardizing U.S. market access for smartphones and other exports that matter more to their economy than metals.

"China will definitely respond. It doesn't want to be seen as weak. But it be will relatively restrained," said economist Louis Kuijs of Oxford Economics. "They don't want to be seen as a party that is wrecking the international trading system."

Global stock markets fell sharply Friday over worries of a possible trade war following Trump's announcement.

Trump thumbed his nose Friday at the concerns over rising trade tensions and higher prices for U.S. consumers, tweeting that "trade wars are good, and easy to win. Example, when we are down \$100 billion with a certain country and they get cute, don't trade anymore - we win big. It's easy!"

Beijing has accused Trump of undermining global trade regulation by taking action over steel, technology policy and other disputes under U.S. law instead of through the World Trade Organization.

Chinese officials have appealed to the White House since last March to avoid hurting both sides by disrupting aluminum trade.

Their tone hardened after Trump launched a probe in August of whether Beijing improperly pressures companies to hand over technology and in January raised duties on Chinese solar modules and washing machines.
